

MOTOR VEHICLE OWNER TO FACE JUSTICE COURT

Woodburn—E. H. Johnson, arrested for recklessly operating a motor vehicle on a public highway on a complaint filed by Patrick C. Gleason of Gervais, and M. A. Burch, arrested for being drunk on a public highway on complaint of a state police officer, appeared in Judge Overton's court Monday afternoon and both entered a plea of not guilty to the charges. Their trial will be held here but the date has not been fixed. Bail was furnished in the sum of \$150 for each of the defendants and they were released.

The case grew out of an accident which happened Sunday night near Gervais when the car driven by Johnson crashed into the car of Patrick Gleason who was accompanied by a girl friend. The Gleason car was damaged but the occupants were not seriously injured although the young lady was thrown from the car. The two men were arrested at Woodburn and the amount of their bail was fixed Sunday night, which they were unable to raise at that time and they were taken to the Marion county jail to spend the night and brought to Woodburn for a hearing Monday afternoon. The car driven by Johnson bore a California license.

George L. Jensen pleaded guilty to the charge of engaging in the occupation of taxidermist without a license after arrest by state police and was given a fine of \$25 and costs of \$2. As the defendant was not aware that it was necessary to have a license for this occupation his fine was suspended by Judge Overton on condition that he procure the license on or before November 16 and pay costs.

SCIO'S BUDGET FOR YEAR SET LOWER FIGURE

Scio—The sum of \$3300 is to be raised by levy and assessment authorized by an ordinance adopted at the November meeting of the Scio town council for the running expenses of the municipal government for the calendar year 1934. This is \$300 less than the budget for the present year, but is in accordance with the budget prepared by the committee appointed by the council some time ago.

Mayor W. A. Ewing reported that the proposal to refund the city indebtedness with a view of securing a lower interest rate had had no new developments since last considered by the council. Bondholders at that time had expressed willingness to comply, in the interest of Scio's financial obligations, but that legal technicalities were then in judicial process and ultimate action in the matter of reducing interest charges would depend upon the outcome of the suit. The mayor informed the council that the matter could not now have to abide the impending court decree.

Councilmen Plummer and Morrison reported an undesirable condition of streets at the W. J. Chromy, S. W. Browne, F. T. Bilyeu, E. C. Shelton and other places in the city, the mayor adding that leaks in the mains at various points waste water and make it inconvenient for citizens at those places. The mayor also called attention to repeated action of the council in recent months in instructing the street committee to take proper action in the matter. Councilman Bryan also stated that street repairs were needed near the Sims place. Councilman Roadman reported that a little grading had been done that day. The proper committee was introduced to purchase collars and such other equipment as would be required to make repairs in the water system.

Mayor Ewing called attention to an apparent discrepancy in the meter indication of water used at the school building, stating that the record showed about 6000 gallons per month, whereas the figure usually has been 20 to 25 thousand gallons per month. Investigation was ordered. It was stated that the J. M. Holes sawmill in the south outskirts of the city used about 25,000 gallons of water during the month of October.

A report was made by the mayor to the effect that official information had been presented to him that the city might avail itself of the opportunity to secure federal loans and grants under a recent enactment for the purpose of sewage work. He had informed the parties that the city would not undertake such work at this time, he said.

The diamond celebration of the admission of Oregon into the union is to be observed at Medford and Scio has been invited to participate in an appropriate manner, according to a proclamation by Governor Meier, which was read by the mayor. The event is to take place February 13, 1934.

The sum of \$282.25 was allowed in payment of the bill of Nelson Bros. of Salem for the construction and erection of the new 6000 gallon galvanized iron water reservoir for the city system. All members of the council were present, and O. B. Cyrus was at his desk as recorder.

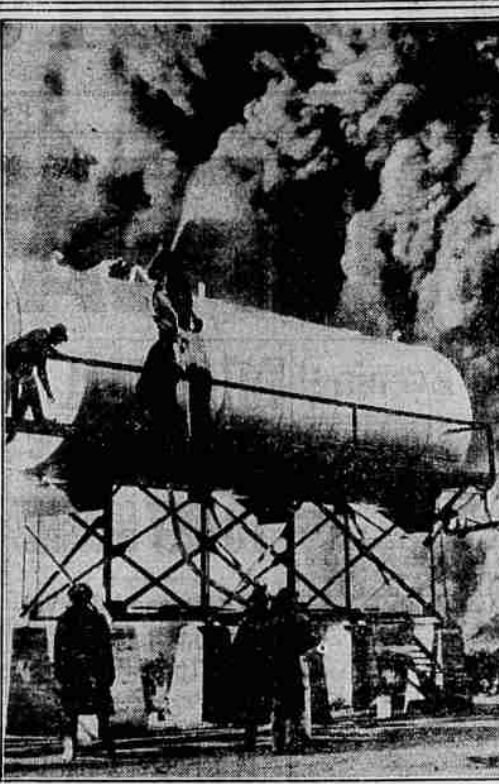
