

WOODBURN POST ARMISTICE DAY IS HUGE EVENT

Woodburn—All roads will lead to Woodburn Saturday, Nov. 11, when one of the biggest Armistice day celebrations ever staged by the American Legion will take place.

First call for the big parade will be sounded at 10:30 o'clock and assembly at 10:50. At 10:50 all units will be prepared to move. The formation will be in five sections in columns of four and the line of march will be on Front street north to Lincoln, west on West Lincoln to First, south on First to corner, where the parade will convene, passing in front of the armory for the program, weather permitting, otherwise inside the building.

The first section of the parade, commanded by Major Oliver S. Olson, will include the staff, Hubbard band, Howitzer company, 168th Infantry, World War Veterans, Mexican Border Veterans, Auxiliary unit, No. 46, Gold Star Mothers in caps and Civil war veterans in caps.

The second section will include the Hungry Seven band, Spanish war veterans, Relief Corps, baseball 1933 champions, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls, with H. M. Austin in command.

The Chemawa Indian school band will lead the third section followed by fraternal organizations, civic organizations, school classes and units, costumes, pep parade and fire department with Milton Coy in command.

Sid George of Eugene will be the principal speaker during the program hour at the armory. City councilmen from Woodburn, Gervais, Hubbard and Mt. Angel will have places in the reviewing stand and the speakers' platform.

A dinner will be served at the armory at noon by the Auxiliary, with Mrs. Myrtle Smith in charge. The main feature of the afternoon will be the football game at 2 o'clock, which will be a real struggle between the victorious and scrappy Woodburn Bulldogs and the unbeaten Chemawa Indians. The grounds will be in first class condition and polished.

The day will wind up with a big dance at the armory, which will begin at 9 o'clock. Music will be by a band made of 12 World war veterans lately demobilized from Siberia and way points. It is reported they were of General Wrangle's staff.

Prizes will be given for a number of entrants in the parade and this contest is open to all comers in the territory bounded on the north by Canby, on the south by Brooks, on the east by Molalla and on the west by St. Paul, inclusive.

The following prizes have been offered by Woodburn merchants:

Best group or unit of grade school girls—first prize, sack of flour; second prize, box of cigars.

Funniest looking Legionnaire—first prize, pocket knife.

Pets—first prize, 1 year subscription to Woodburn Independent; second prize, sack of feed; third prize, two cans dog food; fourth prize, pocket knife; fifth prize, one can dog food.

Costumes—first prize, shoes; second prize, sweater; third prize, sack; fourth prize, compact; fifth prize, necklace; sixth prize, haircut.

Floater—first prize, one barrel of beer; second prize, one case of beer; third prize, one case of beer; fourth prize, \$5 cash, given by the Legion.

In order to win the first prize for floats the float will have to reach certain standards of merit and ingenuity on the part of the sponsor. Judges are so instructed. No makeshifts in order to win a barrel of beer will be over.

Windows will be judged Friday afternoon with Mrs. Vena Dodge as chairman of the judging committee.

Costume judges will be Mrs. Ray Glatt, Miss Esther Hettlinger and Mrs. A. E. Austin. Judges for the pet parade and floats to be announced later.
