

### SILVERTON HAS ARMISTICE DAY TALK, DINNER

Silverton—"Wars have never done anything but destroy civilization"; "No man can fight for his country for by so trying, he destroys his country"; and "No one won the World War—the whole world lost it," were the points stressed by Roy Hewitt, assistant to the Attorney General, in his talk to a large audience at the Silverton armory when he was principal speaker on the patriotic program of Armistice day celebration. Kenneth Hansen, commander of Delbert Reeves post, was master of ceremonies. He presented Marcus L. Latham, the last Civil War veteran living in Silverton; Chris Quail and O. B. Howell, both veterans of the Spanish-American war; Attorney Hewitt and Miss Billie Johnson, president of the Auxiliary, all of whom were seated on the stage during the services.
