

OREGON HAS INSIDE TRACK FOR NEW YEAR CLASH

TROJANS ALONE STAND IN WAY OF WEBFOOTS

Pasadena, Calif., Nov. 13 (AP)—While the potential eastern rose tournament football game candidates continued undisturbed by defeat, a possible Pacific coast defender had popped up in the northwest today in the form of Oregon. While the green-garbed gridsters from Eugene, Ore., as the lone unbeaten member of the Pacific coast conference as well as of the western slope, held the inside track today, there was some question as to the chance of their holding the position after next Saturday when they clash with Southern California at Los Angeles.

A victory for the Trojans, whose string of 27 games without a defeat was broken by Stanford, would throw the situation into a jumbled mess with Southern California, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford and California, all with one defeat against them, in the running.

The only possible change in the eastern, middle west or southern sectors was the indication from several sources that a Big Ten team had no more chance than last year in gaining the permission to participate in the January first game. That seemed to eliminate either Michigan or Purdue.

Army, a probable first choice, and Princeton, equally as enticing a grid morsel to the rose tournament association, remained unbeaten but there were barriers in the way for either team. Duke and Georgia moved along unmolested in the southland, but Georgia plays in Los Angeles Dec. 2 against Southern California which appeared to balk any chance of the Bulldogs playing in the same vicinity twice in 30 days.

Back to the middle west, Nebraska, newly crowned Big Six champion, was looked upon with more than passing interest. The Cornhuskers undoubtedly will get even more attention should they handle Pittsburgh and Iowa successfully in the two remaining games.

GERVAIS BEATEN BY WOODBURN

Woodburn—The Woodburn Bulldogs, Willamette Valley Intercollegiate League champions, swamped the Gervais Union high school football team 34 to 0 on the Woodburn gridiron Saturday afternoon. The game was the main feature of the American Legion Armistice day celebration. Woodburn scored in the early minutes of the game when G. Koch recovered the opening kickoff on the Gervais 27 yard line and from that point, with Boyle and Halter doing most of the ball carrying, scored a touchdown with Boyle going over from the seven yard line. Halter made the extra point with a smash off tackle.

Woodburn scored its second touchdown in less than three minutes of play. They took the ball on the Gervais 49 and from there worked the ball over with Halter scoring from the two yard line. Halter again bucked the line successfully. The next score came in the second quarter when Boyle ran back a Gervais punt to the 11-yard line and on the first play Sinram, on an end-around play scored standing up. Skiller converted on a line smash. The half ended with Woodburn leading 21 to 0, and they were again threatening to score as the gun ended the half. Larson had just blocked a Gervais punt and it was Woodburn's ball on the Gervais one-yard line.

Woodburn's only score in the third quarter was on Boyles' brilliant run back of a punt. They scored again in the last quarter.

This was the last game of the season on the Woodburn field. Two games remain on the Bulldog schedule, next Friday at Silverton and on November 24 they will journey to Dallas. According to predictions Woodburn should win both contests.

SEVEN MAJOR SQUADS SEEK GRID THRONE

New York, Nov. 13 (AP)—Seven teams for the throne of American football today, ready to pick up the scepter relinquished by Southern California.

But of these seven, only Army's golden-helmeted warriors seemed certain, in advance, to reserve their unblemished record for another week. All of the others, Oregon, Michigan, Georgia, Duke, Princeton and Nebraska, were booked against traditional rivals of formidable power. Briefly here's what these contenders still have in front of them: Army—Penn Military is a breather this week after which the Cadets face Navy and Notre Dame.

Michigan—The Wolverines must get past powerful Minnesota this week and then Northwestern to clinch Big Ten honors and possible national championship recognition.

Oregon—Hitherto apparent to the Pacific coast throne and the Rose Bowl assignment, Oregon must tie or defeat Southern California this week. The Webfoots' final game is with St. Mary's Gaels.

Princeton—Navy this Saturday, then Rutgers and Yale. Georgia—The Bulldogs have Auburn to meet this week and then

Oregon's brilliant victory assured Coach Prink Callison of at least a time for the Pacific coast conference championship—thanks to Stanford's 13 to 7 win over Southern California.

Those who questioned Oregon's class were reminded of their lack of Georgia Tech and Southern California.

Duke—North Carolina, North Carolina State and Georgia Tech is a big order for the Blue Devils.

Nebraska—The Cornhuskers have Pitt and Iowa to face on the next two Saturdays. Oregon State's clash with Fordham at the Polo grounds and Georgia Washington's tussle with Tulane complete the interconference slate.
