COAST ENVOYS ASK CHAMBER COOPERATION

Ambassadors of good will for the Oregon Coast highway association, Earl H. Hill of Gresham, president, and Ed Miller, of Marshfield, secretary, spoke at the chamber of commerce luncheon Monday noon in the interest of cooperation and solidarity between the inland and the coast communities, and U. S. highway 101 as the route is officially designated.

Promotion and development of the highway which embraces seven counties in Oregon and Del Norte county in California is the objective of the association, President Hill declared. Cooperation with the inland cities is necessary with lateral highways east from the coast advocated.

Major portions of the highway program included the completion of the entire highway, with its five bridges and the filling of the remaining improved but graded sections, Miller said. The plan embraces a cut-off from the Nehalem river to connect with Cannon Beach, cutting down 17 miles. Cross roads from Eugene to Mapleton in particular were urged while the association is non-committal about the proposed Wolf Creek or Wilson river routes to provide Portland with a shorter route to the ocean. Conditional support is also given the proposed bridge across the Columbia river at Astoria, closing the last gap in the highway from Mexico to British Columbia.

The publicity program, hampered by a lack of funds, depends for the present upon the press, that of Salem and the valley being particularly praised by the speaker.

Medley Dies in Vet Hospital

James (Bunny) Medley, veteran of the World War, a member of Capital post, American Legion, of Salem, and for a number of years connected with a shoe shine parlor on State street, passed away after a short illness, Sunday afternoon at the Veterans hospital, Portland. Medley was taken to Portland about 10 days ago. An operation was performed. It was discovered at that time that he could not survive.

Medley, a colored man, native of Texas was in charge of equipment for the local drum corps for several years and went with the outfit on many of its long trips. He was with the organization during its recent trip to Chicago. He is survived by a mother and sister, both residing in Portland.

Funeral services will be held from the Clough-Barrick chapel Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Music will be provided by the Clough-Barrick quartette. The body will be in charge during graveside services. Interment will be in the Legion circle, Cityview cemetery.

James Medley was born in Brenum, Texas, February 22, 1888 and enlisted at Portland, Aug. 2, 1918, serving overseas with Co. E, 81st Pioneer Infantry and was discharged at Camp Lewis, Wash. August 9, 1919. He was a member of Portland post No. 1 of the American Legion and transferred to Capital post No. 9 here in 1923.

COURT REFUSES BANK DECISION

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—The appeal of the American and National league baseball clubs of Philadelphia, challenging the validity of the federal anti-trust law, was refused today by the supreme court.

In a short session, the court also refused to rule whether receivers of insolvent national banks must honor drafts issued by their banks while solvent, but not paid before the banks closed their doors.

The case came up in two proceedings involving drafts issued by the First National Bank of Dublin, Ga., and the First National Bank of St. Petersburg, Fla., at the time of the currency emergency. The importance of the case because of the number of closed banks, and insisted the drafts were cancelled, releasing the funds represented by them for the benefit of the creditors.

The question came before the court in a request by the fifth circuit court of appeals for instructions. The court declined to give them on the ground that the answer would not have disposed of the cases now pending before the circuit court.

GANGS RETALIATE AGAINST JOURNAL

Manassas, O., Nov. 13 (AP)—Desire of the underworld to retaliate for the editorial campaign against crime and vice conditions was believed responsible today for the bombing of the plant of the Manassas News-Journal here early Sunday.

A crude, make-shift bomb was thrown through the front window of the plant, evidently aimed at the printing presses. It fell short of its mark, but wrecked the mailing room, blew furniture and fixtures to pieces, and damaged adjoining buildings.

The explosion was the fifth newspaper bombing here in many years and, like the others, was laid to organized crime.

John Richards, 55, night watchman, was on duty when the blast occurred, but was not hurt. Two mysterious telephone calls were made to the home of George J. Kochenderfer, one before and one after the bombing. Kochenderfer

CHILD'S BURNS FATAL

Portland, Nov. 3 (AP)—Burns which he suffered when the home of his parents was destroyed by fire Sunday, caused the death yesterday of Robert Reid, 3½ years old. The child was asleep when the fire was discovered by his grandmother, who had been outside. She entered the flaming residence despite efforts of other persons to restrain her, and carried the boy out.

FARM CONTROL IDEAL VISIONED BY WALLACE

Chicago, Nov. 13 (AP)—Secretary Wallace envisioned today the complete control, acre by acre, of all America's farm land with only rich soil used for farming and the remainder devoted to forests, recreation, residence, and the like.

"The things which this administration has done thus far in 1933 may seem spectacular but they are only a faint foreshadowing of some of the things which will ultimately be necessary before the United States has finally made for herself a new true place in the family of nations," Wallace said.

The secretary of agriculture addressed the association of land grant colleges and universities. He described farmers over the past few years as "striving as desperately as the slaves of Pharaoh to produce the maximum," which he said combined with "a battle of trade barriers which in the last four years has wrought as much havoc as the world war has itself." To build up the world war has wrought as much havoc as the world war has itself.

Admitting there had been errors in the farm recovery program, Wallace said he was encouraged that "so many millions of people, in spite of the malcontents, are beginning to get the feeling of a common goal voluntarily and intelligently approached."

He said reduction of "key" crops, corn, cotton and wheat might threaten to make overproduction in other lines, such as livestock, and said the farm program must be far reaching because of that fact.

The ramifications of an experiment like this are frightening to many people; it is so much easier to do nothing, or at least to do only those things which will not be disturbing to the timid, even if it does involve making the same old mistakes," Wallace said.

"By the terms of this emergency adjustment system, if for no other reason, we are for the first time being forced to get at the facts of our land situation, forced to shape policies and to take steps for the years ahead."

"As it is, fat land lies idle because with a surplus of production there is no justification now for reclaiming it, and cruelly bad land is being worked by poverty stricken families, wearing out their lives to go good purpose, carrying themselves, their neighbors, and their communities down to the meanest sort of an existence in a welter of tax delinquency, impossible debts, and deteriorating local institutions."

GUILTY CONSCIENCE SATISFIED AT LAST

Modesto, Cal., Nov. 13 (AP)—S. J. Smith, former Klamath Falls, Ore., carpenter, was in the county jail today after "bumping" his way here from Oregon to demand prosecution on a bad check charge.

Hungry, footsore and bruised, Smith walked into the sheriff's office and declared he passed a worthless check for \$12 on a grocer. "Now my conscience is satisfied," he concluded.

Smith gave himself up to Klamath Falls authorities several days ago, but California authorities refused to extradite him because of the expense involved.

WATER BONDS CASE ARGUED IN CIRCUIT COURT

Judge Lewelling faced an afternoon of heavy legal arguments today with the matter of O-W Water company bonds back in his court from the supreme court, and also the mandamus proceedings of the Allied Truck Owners against Charles M. Thomas, utilities commissioner up for argument on the return of the writ.

The water case came up on a demurrer to the answer which was filed by the water company. The supreme court reversed Judge Lewelling in holding the water bond issue invalid and now the matter comes along on its merits again. The city had filed a reply to the answer of the water company and then interposed the demurrer which took the place of the reply. The demurrer attacks a number of paragraphs in the answer on ground they do not constitute defenses.

Various attorneys had appeared in the Allied Truck Owners mandamus proceedings this afternoon but the attorney general or his deputy was not on the scene as time for arguments was drawing near. Neither had a demurrer or an answer to the proceedings been filed by the attorney general. It had been reported that Commissioner Thomas would lie down on the proceedings, the mandamus was to compel him to enforce the law and declare invalid his \$10 permits under the bus and truck law.

A. C. Anderson, early this afternoon, came in and filed a motion to be permitted to intervene in the case and his complaint in intervention showed he was alleging the \$10 permits valid, and that Commissioner Thomas had a legal right to issue them and operate a legal right to operate under them. The court was expected to pass on the motion before proceeding further with arguments, although it was possible the utility commissioner's reputed move, might also appear and lie down on the proceedings.

TEACHERS ASK FOR NEW SCHOOL FUND

Portland, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—A resolution adopted here late Saturday by the board of trustees of the Oregon State Teachers' association, urged the legislature to create a state school fund from sources other than property taxes.

The resolution pointed out that some state action is necessary to adjust inequalities between rich and poor school districts.

It further urged that the tax collection system be revised to prevent a complete breakdown of the school system in some districts.
