POLL INDICATES INFLATION HAS EASY MAJORITY

(Copyright, 1933, by United Press) Washington, Nov. 13 (UP)—Inflation sentiment appears to have the upper hand in congress in the light of a poll by the United Press. Indications are that unless administration measures produce marked results by January, congress will return in a mood to take the bit in its teeth.

In a poll of the house 58 per cent of the replies favor inflation. Twenty-one per cent are opposed to it. The remaining twenty-one per cent are either neutral or are not prepared to take a position.

Among those taking a definite position, inflationists outnumbered those opposed by more than 2 1/2 to 1.

These figures, gathered from members covering every state, show a complete cross-section. They confirm the belief of the chief inflationist, Senator Elmer Thomas, Dem., Okla., that congress will return in a mood to take matters out of the hands of the administration and make action mandatory unless present price raising policies produce a clear cut result.

Thomas and Senator Smith, Dem., Pa., have invited Senators Pittman, Wheeler, Borah, Harrison and Fletcher to meet with directors of the committee of the national and farm leaders at a monetary conference here Friday.

Senators Thomas and Smith said the president's gold policy was "making progress" but that it must be carried further until gold is \$41.34, double the statutory price.

The president surveyed the results of his gold operations at a long conference with his ranking financial advisers Sunday. All declined to reveal what conclusions were reached.

FREEDOM OF PRESS URGED IN RESOLUTION

Chicago, Nov. 13 (UP)—A specific guarantee of freedom of the press in the newspaper code being formulated under the NRA is of "utmost importance," the board of directors of the American Society of Newspaper Editors said in a statement issued today.

A resolution adopted at the fall meeting of the directors stated "it is of the utmost importance... The code shall contain a specific statement on behalf of the government. That acceptance of the code shall not be construed as waiving, abrogating or modifying the rights of free speech and freedom of the press."

The resolution read: "Whereas, the national recovery act and its enforcement present possibilities of direct or indirect restrictions of the freedom of the press, and

"Whereas, it is beyond all question that the freedom of the press was guaranteed in the first amendment to the constitution not to confer a special and peculiar privilege upon the press but in order to protect the fundamental rights and essential liberties of a free people, and

"Whereas, there is an effort to create an opinion that special immunities are being sought for newspaper publishing as a business under the guise of defending the liberty of the press, making a specific statement of the position of the society desirable.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the board of directors of the American Society of Newspaper Editors considers it a matter of the utmost importance to the American people as well as to the press that the newspaper code now being formulated under the provisions of the national recovery act shall contain a specific statement on behalf of the government as one of the contracting parties that the acceptance of a newspaper code is not intended to, and shall not be construed as waiving, abrogating or modifying the rights of free speech and the freedom of the press as these are guaranteed under the constitution of the United States and the several states."
