

W U SMOTHERS MISSIONARIES BY 40-0 SCORE

Willamette university's football team, although it failed to win the Northwest conference championship, thanks to a few untoward breaks up at Tacoma early in the season, completed a highly successful grid season at Walla Walla Thursday when they handed the Whitman Missionaries a 40 to 0 defeat, one of the worst trimmings Coach Borleske's squad has ever received. The Bearcats returned to Salem Friday forenoon.

Willamette scored six touchdowns against Whitman, two each in the first, third and fourth periods. The Bearcats were within four yards of a seventh touchdown when the game ended.

There was no doubt of the outcome after the first few minutes of play for Willamette scored shortly after the opening whistle and kept the Missionaries on the defensive throughout.

Whitman was able to make but one first down while Willamette was piling up 26.

Thirteen plays after the opening kickoff Willamette had its first score after a 70 yard march. Oravec kicked goal to place the Bearcats ahead 7 to 0. After taking the ball on their own 21, Willamette scored again in 10 plays with Oravec and Olson doing most of the work. The Bearcats were unable to reach paydirt during the second period but at the start of the second half the steam rolled on up steam once more and started rolling. Taking the ball on its own 47, Willamette scored without losing the pigskin. Whitman lost the ball on a fumble shortly after on its own 44. Olson reeled off 13 and Oravec in two subsequent runs scored.

At this juncture, Coach Keene sent in an entire new team and with Eddie Prantz at the throttle the momentum of the Bearcat attack slowed down not the slightest. The new crew quickly added two more touchdowns, one by Prantz and another by Pettys after receiving a pass from Prantz.

Oravec, in the clear at one point of the game, would have scored another touchdown, but he stumbled "over a blade of grass" as he declared, and fell. Eddie Prantz' passing was something to marvel at, his teammates declared. He was deliberate, bided his time and shot accurately.

There were few casualties—Mike Balkovic, Lowell Gribble sustained knee injuries. Loren Grannis a bruised heel while Manfred Olson collected a nice shanty over one of his eyes. It is understood Olson's partner in the little exchange of field pleasantries carried a beautiful bloody nose through most of the game.

We all agree with Coach Huntington's comment following yesterday's game in Portland, "We would like to meet the Colonials again some time."

Dame Fortune who had smiled on Coach Huntington and his group of stalwart gridiron warriors during a long football season, turned her caressing glances elsewhere Thursday afternoon on Multnomah field and some 10,000 turkey day celebrants watched the Washington Colonials, champions of Portland, add to their laurels by turning in a 14 to 0 victory over the red and black. While few will venture the opinion there are two touchdowns difference between the two squads, it cannot be denied the Colonials played the best game Thursday and deserved to win. It could easily have been a scoreless tie.

And while Salem failed to muster the flashing attack which had characterized its play through the greater part of the season, two magnificent goal line stands on the part of the red and black crew will be long remembered by those fortunate enough to witness the contest. Backed into their own territory by the slashing reverse drives of Collins, as elusive a ball carrier as one could ask for, the Salem line refused to yield touchdowns in fact the Colonials after driving to the Salem 3 yard stripe for a first down, were shoved back six yards through the tackling of Moody and Engel.

PARRISH BEATS LESLIE SQUAD SCORE 26 TO 0

Leslie junior high school will have to await another year for a football victory over Parrish. The north and south exhibited a versatile attack on Sweetland field Wednesday afternoon to defeat Leslie for the second time this season, the score being 26 to 0.

Although the score was somewhat one-sided, the game was far from being that for Coach Flesher's players more than held their own during a considerable portion of the game and had it not been for a couple of breaks during the first period, there would not have been more than two touchdowns difference at the conclusion.

Leslie exhibited an aggravated attack of the jitters at the outside and before they had recovered their equilibrium, Parrish had checked up two touchdowns. Leslie perked up considerably following the second touchdown and at one stage advanced to the Parrish 10, where the ball was lost on a fumble. Although Leslie kept in the Parrish front yard during a big portion of the second half, they could not muster enough punch to score.

The south sliders received the initial kick off and immediately lost the ball on their own 15 when the pass from center went over the ball carrier's head. A lateral pass with Meyers on the receiving end gave Parrish a touchdown on the next play. Hoffer kicked goal.

Parrish blocked a Leslie punt shortly after the next kick off and recovered on the Leslie 13. Coach Hauk's boys were unable to pene-

trate farther than the 8 and when Leslie kicked off Hoffer immediately ran the ball back for a touchdown. A line play failed to gain the extra point.

Parrish changed its strategy at the start of the third period after Leslie had stopped their line plays and a third touchdown soon resulted. Meyers passed to Hoffer, who was chased out of bounds on the Leslie 10. A line play lost 5 and Meyers tossed the ball over the right side of the line to Hoffer, who went over the final white stripe. The kick for goal was wide.

With a heavy fog drifting onto Sweetland field, spectators were scarcely able to follow the players. Let alone the ball. Another lateral placed Parrish in a favorable scoring position and they chalked up another touchdown by plugging at the line. Watanabe carried the ball on the final drive. A five yard penalty assessed against Leslie aided materially in the final score.

BEAVERS TAKE 22-0 TROUNCING FROM NEBRASKA

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 1 (UP)—One of the most successful football seasons ever enjoyed by the University of Nebraska passed into history today after the 22 to 0 trouncing the Cornhuskers gave the Oregon State Beavers in a Thanksgiving day intercollegiate classic.

The holiday crowd of 25,000 saw George Henry Sauer, Nebraska's great triple threat fulback, pitted against the versatile Norman Franklin of Oregon State, and it was these two who played leading rolls in the turning point of the game.

Nebraska scored a touchdown in the second quarter, largely on the strength of two passes, but missed on the try for extra point. Late in the third period Franklin made a good punt return and 20 yards in the next two plays to put the ball on the Nebraska 16-yard line.

Franklin and W. Joslin carried the ball to the Huskers' 5-yard line for a first down. Four shots at the Nebraska line yielded little more than three yards and the Huskers took the ball as the period ended.

Punting from behind his goal, and with an advantage of a light breeze, Sauer's kick went over Franklin's head. The Beaver flash jumped for the ball, barely touched it and then rucked back to the 12-yard line, grabbed the ball and got back to his 20-yard line, then a bad pass from center sent Franklin chasing for the ball behind the end zone and Nebraska scored a safety.

The heavy Beaver line which outweighed the Nebraska forwards more

than 10 pounds to the man, wilted and Nebraska put over two more touchdowns in rapid fire, counting on the tries for extra points. Sauer made the first of these two touchdowns on a 28-yard off-tackle sprint and took a pass for the extra point.

MURRAY ACTS FANS ARE SORE

Norman, Okla., Dec. 1 (UP)—Governor William H. Murray's "army" had the cash, Oklahoma A. and M. college had the victory and 500 fans were indignant today because they missed seeing the kick-off in the annual game between Oklahoma university and A. and M. college.

Fifty-five national guardsmen, conducting the first game in the country under military auspices, impounded all the receipts and tickets stubs and took them away to Oklahoma City last night after A. and M. won the game 13 to 0.

Murray suspected sale without authorization of "duplicate tickets." The youthful soldiers, inept at the job of ticket-taking, worked so slowly that long lines of customers were still outside the big stadium at Owen field when the whistle blew for play to start.

Drinking and disturbances were almost non-existent in contrast with conduct at previous games. The militia moved into the stands to help faculty members and 40 special deputies keep order and spot flasks.

The Murray maneuver, coming with suddenness, was said to have resulted from a private investigation he has had made of conduct of the athletic field at the university here.

OREGON WHIPS GAELE FOOTBALL TEAM, 13 TO 7

San Francisco, Dec. 1 (UP)—For the first time in five years of football rivalry, the University of Oregon held a victory over the St. Mary's Gaels today—the score, 13 to 7.

Defeated in four previous encounters, the Webfooters outsmarted and out fought the Gaels at Kezar stadium yesterday and Oregon rooters, hilarious over the victory, broke up and carried away a goal post.

Backed up by Mike Mikulak "Iron Man" fullback, the Oregon line more than matched the St. Mary's forward wall while tricky backfield maneuvers left the Gaels befuddled at times.

Almost before the 20,000 spectators had taken their seats the Webfooters launched an attack, with Temple and Gee leading the charges that carried the ball 67 yards for a touchdown. On a fake run, Temple forward passed to Gee to end the drive with a score for the northerners. Temple converted with a place kick.

St. Mary's, held scoreless throughout the first half, tied the count early in the third period as George Wilson, halfback, slashed and weaved 11 yards and fumbled in the end zone only to have the ball recovered on scoring ground by George VanRinus, Gael end. Parlee converted.

With the ball on the Gael's five yard stripe at the opening of the last period, Temple cracked tackle for two. Gee was thrown for a three yard loss. Then, a reverse from Mikulak to Parke, cagey Oregon quarterback, completely deceived the Gaels. Parke raced around end for the winning touchdown without a hand being placed on him. Temple's kick was short.
