

TWO WOODBURN CITY OFFICERS GET JOB AGAIN

Woodburn—Dr. Gerald B. Smith was re-appointed as city health officer by a unanimous vote of the city council which met in regular session Tuesday night. Mayor Broyles also announced the re-appointment of Alfred Aahland as chief of police.

The offer of \$500 for five city lots on Harrison street was accepted and the mayor and recorder authorized to issue a quit-claim deed to the property.

A request from William H. Huntley who is in charge of government relief work in Woodburn, for permission to use an upper room at the city hall for living quarters was granted and the rental placed at \$3 a month.

A request from the Woodburn post of the American Legion for permission to remove 25 or 30 trees from the city park in order to make room for a playground according to a project submitted for federal funds, was granted upon motion. The Legion also asked for an extension of time of the prior rights held by them but as the time of expiration of this contract is a year distant it was deemed advisable to delay action.

It was reported by Recorder Beach that the two walnut trees which were last week cut down at the library square, had been sold for \$25 and the money received.

STATE TAX GROWS IN LINN COUNTY

Albany—Linn county property tax payers will pay in 1934 a larger state tax than this year, according to official figures received late yesterday from the state tax commission by the Linn county assessor.

For 1934 the state is asking the county for \$96,587.48, while its requirements for the year 1933 were \$89,040.05. However, partial compensation for the increase will be found in the state elementary school tax which in 1934 the school tax will be \$58,991.33 compared with \$62,103.78 this year.

Combined state tax an elementary school tax requirements for the next year will be \$155,578.81 as compared with \$151,143.81.
