

SCHOOL GROUND CONSTRUCTION PROGRESSING

Hubbard—In spite of the unfavorable weather, the work at the school is going on satisfactorily. All the concrete work for the new gymnasium and the walls will be finished this week. It is expected that the new building will be ready for use in February. This building and the two tennis courts are on the property adjoining the school yard which was recently purchased from Miss Lena Kester.

The tennis courts will be of the double variety and built of concrete. In order to facilitate the removal of the large maple trees north of the lawn, these trees and those still on the grounds were planted by the late Lewis Dayton 50 years ago when he owned the piece of land. A year ago these trees were severely pruned leaving only the trunks and the barks of the larger branches. This was done to save the trees from death resulting from dry rot but it destroyed the beauty of the trees.

Other work now under way on the school grounds are the removal of the unfertile soil from the lawn and replacing it with a top soil from the garden tract purchased from Miss Kester. This will add the shrubbery which was planted by the Hubbard woman's club. A small plot of ground lying east of the play shed has been planted with the baseball diamond in order to raise it for drainage.

This school building work is being financed by appropriations by the district and by C.W.A. funds. The greater part of the labor is being done by delinquent taxpayers and relief workers. The project is expected to add to the usefulness and beauty of the school and at the same time to put money into local circulation.

BECKMAN TELLS ABOUT CONTROL

LUCKIAMUTE RIVER BANKS ARE SWOLLEN

Monmouth—With the heavy rainfall of Monday and Tuesday melting the snow, plainly discernible on the hills west of Monmouth, the secondary highway in the Elkins community is under several feet of water in the two lower stretches and all lowland known to be Big Luckiamute and Little Luckiamute rivers badly flooded.

The high water came Tuesday night without warning and several hours before it was expected, filling the river bank to overflowing and inundating the river bottoms, causing much loss of stock. On Tuesday A. A. Nelson, in knee length rubber boots, crossed the river at its lowest point on its farm.

Wednesday morning he awoke to find many acres of the farm covered with water and about fifty head of his herd of hogs drowned. Farther east along the river, where the peak of the flood was not felt until after daylight, the farmers were busy salvaging what stock they could from the swirling waters.

One bridge is known to be torn from its foundation and another is thought to be badly damaged. The Lewisville-Elkins school bus which brings pupils to the Monmouth schools, can not reach town and the rural mail carriers for the Luckiamute area is having an enforced vacation.
