DEMPSEY ACT DRAWS CROWD TUESDAY EVE.

Bulldog Jackson and Robin Reed, cast in the roles of villains, and Jack Dempsey as director and promoter, put on a good show at the armory Tuesday night. And when the curtain was rung down by Reed taking a backward dive into the ropes following a feint from the former heavyweight champion, the more than capacity crowd of spectators roared its approval and milled from the building satisfied with the evening's entertainment.

The contestants, buoyed up by the presence in the ring of state royalty, put the utmost of action into their performances. Dempsey, about 20 pounds overweight, got a good workout prying the boys apart and keeping them inside the rings. Several times he piled out on the floor with the contestants and on one occasion gave Reed such a mighty boost that Robin went back through the ropes as from a catapult.

Reed won his match with Rob Roy, taking the first and third falls with body presses. Roy took the intermediate fall with his famous Indian death grip. Reed added a finishing artistic touch to the affair when he circled Dempsey after the final fall and gave Roy a vigorous kick in the ribs. He then committed the ultimate in less majesty by tramping on the toes of the big chief himself. Reed received an ear boxing from the open hand of Dempsey which must have made his head ring for an hour. The former champion then uncorked an uppercut. Had it landed there would have been no occasion for Reed to imitate a perfect knockout. This final act was the cue for Dempsey to make his exit and while the crowd was milling around watching Reed awaken from his self-imposed slumber, the former champion quietly slipped out of the building.

Bulldog Jackson and "Totem Pole" Anderson put on another good show. Jackson, the champion referee, stalled for a moment after entering the ring, giving the impression he wanted some person other than Dempsey to officiate. His antics during the bout brought frequent rebuffs from Dempsey, who threw the Bulldog around at a great rate. "How many men do I have to fight?" protested Jackson at one stage.

After Anderson had won the first fall with a Boston crab, Jackson came back to clamp on such a vigorous hammerlock that the "Totem Pole" was unable to come back for the final round.

Don Sugar lost to Jack Brentano in the opening encounter. Sugar used his sonnenberg to good advantage but failed to follow up.

OREGON STATE TO PLAY WASHINGTON

Portland, Dec. 13 (AP)-The Huskies of Washington, and the Oregon State Beavers will meet on the football gridiron next season in their first game in five years. It was announced after the close of the San Francisco meeting of graduate managers of the coast conference that Washington and Oregon State will play in Seattle next Nov. 3. A game with Montana, originally scheduled for that date, was shifted to Nov. 17. On Nov. 10 Oregon's "big game," the Webfoot-Beaver tussle, will take place at Eugene.

There has been some reason to believe that the Oregon State-Washington State game, set for Oct. 27, may be brought to Multnomah stadium. If this should be done, it would give Portland five big games next season. Games already scheduled for Portland are Sept. 29, Oregon-UCLA; Oct. 6, Oregon State-Stanford; Oct. 13, Oregon-Washington; Dec. 8, Oregon-Louisiana State.

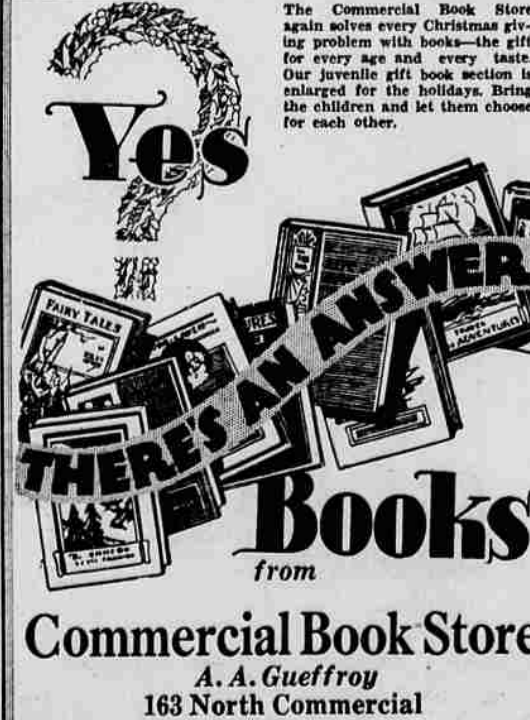
