ROUTINE BUSINESS OCCUPIES COUNCIL.

Woodburn—A brief meeting of the city council was held Tuesday night but no business of importance was transacted. In preparation for the improvement of water mains under the CWA project the water board was instructed to authorize the water superintendent, E. N. Soule, to order the necessary tools to be used. No definite date has been set for the beginning of this work.

A report was given that the cluster light at the corner of Front and Lincoln streets was out of commission and the street commission was authorized to make necessary repairs. C. E. Whitman, fire chief, asked advice as to the advisability of purchasing a battery charger for the two fire trucks and the matter was left to the discretion of the fire board.

NOVEMBER GAS SALES SHOW GAIN

Gasoline sold in Oregon during November totaled 12,137,090 gallons, an increase of 533,507 over November of 1932, reports issued from the secretary of state's office today revealed.

Tax paid to the state from the sales totaled \$906,854 or \$142,935 more than in the same month in 1932. An extra cent tax was levied since then accounting for the large increase in the revenue to the state. Oregon charges five cents tax per gallon.

The amount of gasoline sold for the year to date already exceeds the amount sold during the entire 12 months of 1932, by 92,272 gallons. Total gallonage sold was 147,835,396, bringing in a tax of \$8,728,720, or an increase of \$831,852 over 1932.
