

CORN AND HOG CONTRACTS TO BE SENT SOON

Dallas—Corn-hog reduction contracts will be ready to send out to farmers within the next week or so, Wednesday County Agent J. R. Beck attended a district meeting of county agents to receive instructions in the handling of this phase of the AAA program.

"Many Polk county farmers are eligible to receive the cash benefits from the hog reduction campaign. So far a list of only about 125 has been compiled," stated Mr. Beck. Farmers do not have to raise both corn and hogs to get the benefits under this contract. If he raises only corn he can receive the benefits from that side of the contract. If he raises only hogs he can receive only those benefits or if he raises both he is then eligible for complete cash benefits.

Any Polk county farmer who has had an average of three rows farrow for him during the past two years is eligible for a hog contract or any farmer that has raised as much as ten acres of corn can sign a contract. Farmers who have been buying their pigs do not receive credit on that score. The man that owns the sows is the one that receives the benefits.
