Mickle, chief, dairy and food division of the state department of agriculture, spoke on the increase of the butter consumption and control of production. "Present Day Economic Conditions" was the subject on which Roy Hewitt, assistant attorney general, spoke.

A banquet was served at noon in the dining hall of the school. Approximately 30 business men of Mt. Angel assisted in serving. Dinner cards had been presented to all the patrons of the creamery in advance.
