RURAL SCHOOL PROGRESS TOLD AT STATE MEET

Monmouth—In an address delivered before the Oregon State Teachers' Association in Portland, President J. A. Churchill gave a review of progress made under his stewardship as director of elementary teacher training in Oregon schools. He explained that by direction of the board of higher education the position was established and a unified curriculum went into effect for Oregon's three Normal schools.

He gave figures to show that at La Grande out of 59 graduates placed 50 went to rural schools; at Ashland out of 66 graduates placed 57 went to rural schools and at Monmouth out of 295 graduates placed 169 went to rural schools. The percentage in Monmouth was 74.4, in Ashland 86.3, and at La Grande 84.7. He explained further that of the number getting city positions the larger number were those who had experience, the accepted rule being that most Normal students must have two years' experience in rural schools before getting positions in city schools.

He opposed the idea that special "rural" courses should be offered for teachers who expect to spend their time among rural surroundings and said the country child should be taught the same facts of history, nature, etc., as the city child and that the wealth of literature should not be withheld from either. He described the operations of the practice school, gave examples of typical practice teaching loads, and said the definite aims are to lend children to develop skill with the tool subjects such as the "three R's"; to teach them how to think, to work and to play and live among people; how to appreciate beauty in nature, in art, in music; the importance of health habits; how to take advantage of their leisure and how to develop originality. Concluding, he showed how these objects are being attained and gave examples of students' enterprises in the training schools.
