WU AND OREGON TEAMS TO TRY INNOVATIONS

Willamette university and University of Oregon basketball teams will engage in an interesting experiment Wednesday night at Eugene when the two clubs get together for the second of their pre-season contests. During a recent fanning bee in Portland engaged in by a number of coaches including "Spec" Keene of Willamette, "Slat" Gill of Oregon State, Bill Reinhardt of Oregon and Howard Hobson, Southern Oregon Normal, considerable criticism of the time lost during the shooting of foul shots was voiced. As a result of the informal conversation Keene and Reinhardt agreed to try out a few innovations of their own. Under their agreement, a player who is fouled while in the act of shooting will be permitted to attempt the conversions if the foul robbed him of a basket. If the basket is made regardless of the foul, he is given no conversion shot. There will be no free shooting otherwise and when a player has four personal fouls charged against him he will be removed from the game as under ordinary rules. Under this system it is believed there will be considerable time saved, especially in trotting back and forth from foul line to another. Following each foul the offending side will be given the ball out of bounds and play will proceed. There will be a face-off if a double foul is committed.

Coach Keene to date has had considerable trouble in speeding up his offense, his players showing considerable reluctance in trying to break through the defense. It is expected this difficulty will be ironed out during this week since intensive drill will be engaged in from now on.

Next Friday night Coach Keene and his players will be host to Olin's Swedes, probably the best independent quint in the country. Playing here two years ago the Swedes gave one of the finest exhibitions ever seen here. The contest is expected to pack Willamette gym.

Football Is Racket Declares Wallace

Washington, D. C., Jan. 1 (AP)—The youngest chief in President Roosevelt's cabinet—Secretary Henry A. Wallace—believes organized college football is a "racket" and that college vitality should find a better outlet.

"As a matter of fact," he said to a national conference on students in politics, "many of us are beginning to wonder if the colleges themselves are as vital as they should be." The agricultural secretary advocated the start of a real "youth movement" as the answer, adding his reading about such movements abroad had led him to believe "that there is something altogether too smug, complacent and self-satisfied about the youth of the United States." He predicted a tremendous increase of youthful interest in politics.
