

SILVERTON HAS MANY READERS REPORT SHOWS

Silverton — Miss Little Madsen, city librarian, with the approval of the board of directors of the library, has submitted the following annual report for the year closing December 31, 1933:

Books lent, 19,186; magazines lent, 1,488; films collected, \$21.49; rentals, \$110.01; new readers added, 338; books removed, 214; books donated, 184; books purchased, 175; books rebound, 69. Total books lent in 1933, 15,426. With the 1933 increase showing 4,760.

Total volumes on January 1, 1934, 1,994; total number of readers, January 1, 1934, 1,315; circulation average for each volume, 9.62; average of each reader, 14.5. During a period of six months of the year including the winter months, a number of readers averaged 12 books on cards for each three weeks. On last Saturday, books lent were 314, the largest daily loan since last January.

The most popular books during the year were Buck's "Good Earth" and Carroll's "As the Earth Turns", as the two leads. During the last six months "Pillars of the Earth" by Hilary Mantel, "The Little Man Who Wasn't There" by Lloyd Douglas, "The Magnificent Obsession" by Lloyd Douglas, "The Pilgrimage to Palestine" by "Mellons" Millions, "Agar's People's Choice", Pitkin's "Life Begins at Forty" and "More Power to You".

Mrs. H. B. Latham and Mrs. G. B. Benson have been members of the library board since its inception more than 20 years ago. Other members of the board are Dr. C. R. Wilson and Charles Reynolds.

GRANGERS HIT AT SALES TAX AND BOOSTERS

Albany, Or. — Governor Julius Meier and members of the recent state legislature who voted for the sales tax were scored by members of the Crowfoot grange at its last meeting.

The text of the resolution is as follows: "Whereas at the request of Governor Meier, the legislature in extraordinary session has just passed a sales tax law and,

"Whereas said sales tax law was passed contrary to the express command of four-fifths of the citizens of Oregon as given at a recent special election, and

"Whereas we believe the school condition in Oregon is nothing like as bad as it is painted by the sales taxers and that the condition, such as it is, was brought about deliberately by the wealthy proponents of the sales tax refusing to pay their property tax, and

"Whereas, other bills were introduced in said session which would have promptly and efficiently relieved the school situation and those bills were promptly killed by the sales taxers, and

"Whereas, government of, by and for the people has been openly and arrogantly challenged,

"Now, therefore, be it resolved by Crowfoot grange that this obnoxious sales tax, which is anathema to liberty-loving people, be defeated, and to that end we pledge our efforts; and,

"Be it further resolved, that we oppose for re-election the governor and every legislator who thus dared to defy the mandate of the people of Oregon."
