Woodburn Park Taking Shape As Work Starts With Big Crew of Men

Woodburn—Much progress is being made at Library Square, the new city park and playground, where 25 men are employed five days each week. The personnel of the organization in charge of the work includes:

Mrs. A. E. Austin, supervisor; James Livesay, foreman; Earl Houseweat, landscape gardener; Ambrose Stader, plumber; and Dewey Allen, cement mason.

The details of the work and the original plan for the entire project was worked out by Mrs. Austin and drafted by Emerson Jones. James Livesay was chosen as foreman for the reason that it was necessary to have a competent and experienced man in charge of the work and Mr. Livesay, who is a member of the park board, is well qualified for the position. Fine work is also being done in landscaping by Earl Houseweat, who has been highly complimented by the CWA officials.

Material for cement work arrived Thursday and some lumber is on the ground and as soon as the material is ready to use more men will be put to work. The allotment of labor is 42 men and the project which is for 60 days will likely be finished by the middle of February.

One of the most expensive units of the project will be the tennis court which will be located on the south side of the park back of the Coe building. Mrs. Austin has held a meeting of tennis fans to be held Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock at the library where suggestions may be given for the construction of the court and probably steps taken to form an organization of tennis players.

An outdoor fireplace of brick to match the library building which occupies the northwest corner of the park will be located on the west side near the playground. The main entrance will be at the corner of First and Garfield streets. A fountain will be located in the center of the block and will be the axis around which the entire park will revolve. The fountain will consist of a gold fish pool 17 feet in diameter with a spray in the center.

A shallow wading pool for children, 25x15 feet, irregular in shape, will be located near the playground on the southwest corner and will be bordered with beach sand. It is planned that people visiting the beach during the summer may be willing to bring home a sack of beach sand for this purpose. Half of the west side of the block will be taken by the playground and tennis court.

A pavilion 24x14 feet of cement and wood will be located against the north wall of the Coe building and will be constructed in formal style. It will be open on three sides and will have three pillars on each of the front corners and one on each side at the back and three steps on each of the open sides. This will be used for public gatherings.

Trees and shrubs will be placed about the park in artistic conformity to the general plan. George Timm, president of the Garden club, is arranging to complete the planting which the Garden club began around the library building. The planting and gold fish for the fountain will be furnished by Mrs. O. W. Noyes. Mrs. Ray Galt will plant the north side of the Coe building with wild flowers and native trees; Earl Houseweat will arrange the landscaping at the entrance and the shrubbery about the fireplace will be arranged by Mrs. Pauline Livesay.

Two lavatories will be constructed at the west end of the Coe building. A number of people have expressed a desire to give a tree or shrub for planting and these will be very welcome to the board.

Office room at the library has been given by the library board and the working men are allowed to eat their lunch in the furnace room where they can be warm and dry. Anthony Gule, janitor of the library, is donating extra time in order to open the rooms early for use of the men. The Maywood company of Salem, owners of the Coe building, is furnishing free storage for materials. The park board wishes to express gratitude to these and many others who have assisted. Support by the press has been much help and the public spirited people of Woodburn who are supporting the project wholeheartedly are making it easy to put it over.
