The occasion is the 32nd birthday of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and 5000 such balls are being sponsored throughout the nation in respect to him and to establish an endowment fund for the Georgia Warm Springs foundation.

In 1926 President Roosevelt established the Georgia Warm Springs Foundation to carry on the national crusade against infantile paralysis and devote unselfishly its full energy and thought to the coordination of the fight against a scourge which, physically handicaps, every year, thousands of American children.

As everyone knows President Roosevelt was severely disabled in 1921 by infantile paralysis and the success of the country-wide party of January 30 sponsored by the citizens of the United States will be testimonial to a man who had waged and won a hard personal fight against what might have been accepted as a lasting handicap.

In the fall of 1924 the President heard of a young man, also a victim of infantile paralysis, who had bathed in the warm pools of the springs. Each day in the pool had helped this young man and at the end of the third summer he was able to walk with the help of a cane, after being helpless before. Mr. Roosevelt went to the springs in the spring of 1925 and was so impressed and also impressed with the improvement of other patients that he decided to conduct some experimental work. Twenty-three patients were put under observation for a period of from 5 to 17 weeks—all with marked improvement. On July 28, 1927, the Foundation was formed, with a number of prominent and public-spirited men as backers. The organization was incorporated to be developed and administered without personal gain or profit. It is now an orthopedic center. The endowment fund, made possible by all of us, will enable the Foundation to carry on and intensify this leadership.

A radio receiving set will be arranged in the armory so that the dancers may hear the programs being broadcast over one of the greatest network hook-ups ever sponsored. President Roosevelt will deliver a personal message to all of the affairs being held that night and a galaxy of screen and stage stars will appear.
