STOCK HOLDERS GET ASSESSED

Albany—Stockholders of the defunct First National Bank of Albany have received notice that 100 per cent assessment on them has been made by J. F. T. O'Connor, comptroller of banks, Washington, D. C. The word came to Albany yesterday to Receiver C. C. Bryant.

The assessment, which has been levied is payable to the receiver on or before February 16, 1934, but stockholders who pay 25 per cent of it that time and provide suitable guaranty that the remainder will be paid, may obtain extensions which call for quarterly installments on May 16, April 16 and May 16 of this year with interest at legal rate, the order read.

The capital stock of the bank was \$125,000. The 100 per cent assessment will raise \$125,000 for the debtors in case every stockholder pays his assessment in full.
