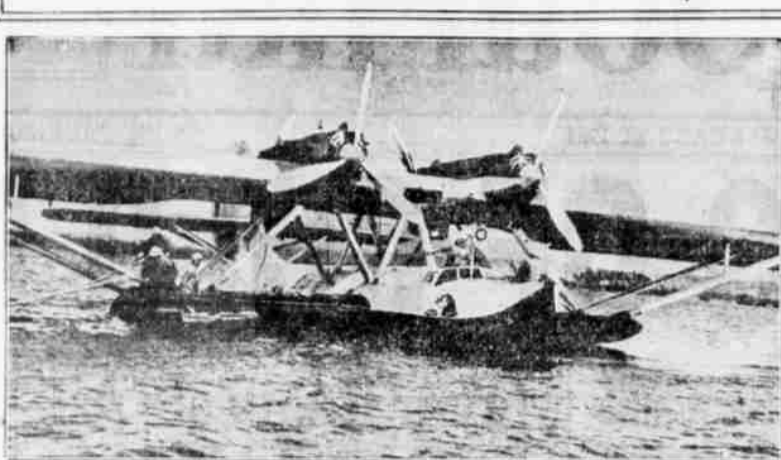
# Men Serve Supper
