

DALLAS YOUTHS GET PROBATION FOR GAS THEFT

Independence—A verdict of guilty was returned in the case of State vs. Allister and Kilander, both of Dallas, in Judge McIntosh's court after the jury had been out about three hours.

Complaint was filed charging defendants with stealing gasoline from the car of Art Black at the training school grounds. They demanded a jury trial with B. F. Swope defending. Several witnesses were called for both sides, the principal witnesses for the state were Art Black, Jimmy DeCoster, Dean Smith, Russell Wilson, Vern Schrank, constable, and J. O. McIntosh, justice of the peace, were also put on the witness stand for the prosecution. Elmer Barnhart headed the state's case. For the defense the following witnesses were heard: LeRoy Kilander, Fay Allister, Miss Nelson, Lloyd Healy, all of Dallas, Hulda Koenig and Rex Swearingen of Independence.

The defendants were 16 and 18 years of age respectively, and a plea in the closing argument of the defense counsel was for leniency on account of their age. District Attorney Barnhart waived opening arguments. The jury was J. H. Hart, Bert Keller, William Poyree, T. D. Pomeroy, Frank Hennigan, and J. L. Van Loan. Numerous ballots were taken before an agreement was arrived at, one holding out for acquittal.

A car containing some gasoline was located by Art Black under the rear of the defendant's car, after he had been apprised of the fact by two small boys that someone was tampering with his car. He found gas missing from the tank, the cap had been removed and fresh gas was found where it had been siphoned from the tank.

The boys were fined \$5 each and costs amounting to \$12.16 each and were placed on probation for six months. Fay Allister is responsible to his brother for his actions during that time and Kilander to his father, who in turn are respectively responsible to the court for their conduct during probation.

LOWLANDS FLOODED BY 12 FOOT STAGE

Independence—A 15 foot stage of water was reached here again Monday following the heavy rains of Sunday and the flood waters of the Santiam which went on a rampage Sunday.
