

CORN AND HOG RAISERS HELD WILLING TO GO

Solo—Approximately 50 farmers attended the hog-corn raising meeting Monday afternoon when P. C. Miller, Lincoln county agent in charge, and A. L. Lindgren, livestock extension specialist of the state college, explained details of the program by which hog production is to be reduced and regulated under federal policies.

Many of the farmers here Monday had participated in the meeting at Albany a week before, in the meantime forming themselves on the subject from literature provided at the Albany conference. Unlike the wheat control movement in its infancy, farmers generally were "ready to go" and the Solo meeting had little delay in getting under effective headway.

Miller explained that Solo is included in the Rock Creek district, emphasizing the fact that all persons within the A. L. Goddard measuring territory should remember that Solo is their place of meeting in the hog-corn campaign.

It was further stated that the Solo district embraces the area around the Solo river and that the line is at or near Solo station, one mile south of Clatskanie. The district all lies east of the Santiam river, Miller added.

A second meeting was announced for Solo at 1:30 o'clock Monday, February 5, at which time it is expected that farmers cooperating in the movement will sign contracts, elect three committeemen to function much as was the case in the wheat movement, and to take other steps necessary in completing the campaign here.

It was reported that there may yet be an opportunity for farmers who did not affiliate with the wheat movement, and who have since signified their desire to do so, to become beneficiaries of the control plan.

Silverton—The negative side of the sales tax question was forthrightly presented Monday night at the open meeting sponsored by the local post of the American Legion with Roy Hewitt of Salem the guest speaker.

No regular business session was held.

FORTY HOUR WEEK FOR MILL WORKERS

Silverton—Official reports of the Silver Falls Timber company mill workers are on a 40 hour a week schedule, an advancement of 10 hours over the previous 30 hour schedule. Work days now begin at 6:40 o'clock in the morning and close at 4:30 in the afternoon with six days inclusive.

The men receive their wages on a new time schedule, known as the four week period, meaning four straight weeks, regardless of the date of the month. The books are closed at the end of each four-week period and payday is 10 days after the close of the pay month. Two payments are available, a draw day and a pay day.
