

LIQUOR PROVES COSTLY TO MEN BEFORE COURT

Woodburn—Perry Graham and John Doe were arrested Wednesday on a complaint filed by Otto Berning, charged with operating a motor vehicle on a public highway while intoxicated. Graham appeared before Judge Overton Wednesday and entered a plea of guilty. He was fined \$250 and will pay costs of \$15.

Graham drove into town at 2 o'clock Wednesday morning, entering on Hardcastle avenue. At the intersection of Front street he failed to make the turn and drove straight into the corner of a building belonging to Mrs. William Schaefer. The corner of the shed was demolished.

"Gard" Murphy appeared in the local court after being arrested on complaint of Jack Cox, charged with buying and having in his possession intoxicating liquor, having over 14 percent of alcohol by volume and not buying said liquor from the state liquor commission. He was held to answer to the charge with his bail fixed at \$250. He was committed to the county jail until bail is raised.

H. P. Vetter, charged by state police with driving a motor vehicle on the public highway without an operator's license, appeared before the judge, and after pleading guilty, was fined \$5 and costs of \$2. His sentence was suspended on condition that he pay the fine and costs by February 3.

Everett Oxford, also arrested for driving without an operator's license, entered a plea of guilty and received a fine of \$5 with \$25.00 costs. In default of payment he was committed to the county jail.
