NEW TRIAL FOR JORDAN GRANTED

The supreme court today granted a rehearing in the first degree murder case against Theodore Jordan of Klamath Falls. The order was handed down orally by the court.

The conviction against Jordan was previously upheld by the state supreme court, but a petition for rehearing was filed immediately. The court ordered a rehearing in an oral memorandum.

Jordan was sentenced to hang for the murder of a Pullman car steward at Klamath Falls. During his appeal to the supreme court, thousands of post cards and other material were sent to the court, demanding that "Jordan must not hang."

These cards charged that Jordan was innocent and that the state should not execute a man who was innocent. They were sent out by the International Labor Defense league.

The court in a written opinion today discharged Frank A. McMenamin, Portland attorney, who was charged by the Multnomah Bar association of "obtaining money under false pretenses."

The opinion was written by Justice J. U. Campbell. Other opinions handed down by the supreme court today were as follows:

ARMED AID FOR AUSTRIA BY LEAGUE

Paris, Feb. 13 (AP)—Henry Berenguer, chairman of the senate foreign affairs committee, suggested unofficially today that it might be necessary for France and other powers of the league of nations to give armed aid to Chancellor Engelbert Dollfus.

The French government already has agreed to send Austria to take her quarrel with Germany before the league of nations.

Government officials doubted that international troops would be sent to Vienna.

The present tax of \$7 per gallon and the figure being mentioned is \$5 per gallon.

It is hoped in this way to meet the threat of bootlegging from the United States.

HOGAN PLEADS FOR M'CRACKEN

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—Frank Hogan, counsel for William P. MacCracken, Jr., told the senate today in his final argument in the air-mail contempt trial that the former Coolidge and Hoover official had no knowledge of the removal or destruction of the Northwest Airway files and had purged himself of contempt by return of the others.

Asking acquittal before a full senate and crowded galleries, he conceded that MacCracken had been in contempt of the senate when he permitted removal of Western Air Express files, but contended he had been completely purged of it when they were returned.

The senate soon thereafter went into executive session to deliberate on all four contempt cases.

The letter attorneys for the defendants are L. H. Britton, vice president of the Northwest Airways; Harris M. Hanes, president of Western Air Express, and Gilbert L. Glavin, Washington representative of the latter company.

FLOOD CONTROL PROGRAM FORMED

Portland, Feb. 13 (AP)—A far-reaching and permanent program of flood control in the lower Columbia river drainage area has been recommended to the Oregon and Washington congressional delegations by the Lower Columbia Associated Chambers of Commerce.

The letter dispatched to the senators and congressmen urged a three point program: Preliminary study and planning for adequate control; a long time, permanent ultimate emergency program for repair of dikes broken during the December and January floods.

It pointed out that the money for financial relief programs could be supplied by the senate commerce committee, the house rivers and harbors committee, or the public works administration.

TAX REVISION RAISES REVENUE

\$258,000,000

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—The tax revision bill, carrying out for the first time since enactment of the income tax law 20 years ago a comprehensive revision of the act, will raise \$258,000,000 annually, the house ways and means committee reported today.

The report was filed as the house rules committee considered a "gas" rule for consideration of the measure beginning tomorrow.

The committee's report urged that it was of the "utmost importance to reduce" estimated federal deficits and that "it will also be imperative to begin a program of retirement of the public debt as soon as possible."

President Roosevelt's request for a revision on the revenue laws to produce \$150,000,000 "is fully provided for in the bill," the committee said.

It estimated additional revenues which would accrue from the bill as follows:

Changes in tax-rate structure, \$28,000,000.

Administration of depreciation allowances \$85,000,000.

Capital gains and losses \$30,000,000.

Personal holding companies (directly or indirectly) \$25,000,000.

Exchanges and reorganizations \$10,000,000.

Dividends out of pre-March 1, 1931, earnings \$6,000,000.

Foreign tax credit \$5,000,000.

Consolidated returns \$20,000,000.

Partnerships \$5,000,000.

Administrative changes in gasoline and lubricating oil taxes, \$30,000,000.

Miscellaneous provisions \$24,000,000.

Total addition revenue \$258,000,000.

All food dealers will be represented and the six administrators will be chosen to represent the independent retailers, chain stores, group-buying stores, independent wholesalers, retail-owned wholesalers and retail meat dealers.

Dealers outside of cities of less than 2500 population come under the code except for its labor hour and wage provisions.

S. Durkheimer of Portland, who attended the Chicago meeting at which the national food code was drafted, will be present at tonight's meeting to explain the code and to answer questions concerning it. He is said to be more fully informed on the matter than anyone in the northwest.

Pope Pius Observes Anniversary Date

Vatican City, Feb. 13 (AP)—The 12th anniversary of the pope's coronation was observed today with an imposing ceremony at St. Peter's.

FLOOD CONTROL MEET IN ALBANY

Members of the county court, with the exception of Commissioner McMenamin, and County Engineer Swart, went to Albany this morning to attend a meeting called by Judge D. O. Woodworth of Linn county to further consider organization of a valley-wide flood control association including all of the counties bordering on the Willamette river.

Judge Woodworth in his letter calling the meeting said that C. C. Hockley, engineer for the state on CWA projects and other CWA engineers were to be present. The latter was sent out to all the counties interested.

Judge Woodworth was named chairman of the proposed organization at a meeting in Albany February 3 when the project was put under way. He said at today's meeting it was at least hoped assurance could be given of an engineering project under the CWA to map out the flood control work and what would be needed to accomplish what the counties are seeking to accomplish.
