POISON BAIT READY FOR DISTRIBUTION

Dallas—Poison bait for 100,000 squirrels has been mixed and will soon be distributed to various parts of the county for the annual campaign against this rodent. There seems to be an extra large number that has wintered through so that poisoning will be more important than ever this year.

A ton of barley, 80 ounces of strychnine, five gallons of syrup and numerous other ingredients are all mixed together to prepare a deadly but tasty bait for squirrel poisoning. These are put up in small cloth bags and sold at cost to the farmers of the county for the purpose of waging war on the grey digger.

March and early April is the best period for poisoning squirrels. They are hungry and will eat most anything that is put out for them. Besides, this precedes their mating season and prevents large families of young squirrels coming on a little later in the summer.

Stores and farmers in various parts of the county cooperate with the county agent's office in handling the supply of squirrel poison. These small bags are soon to be placed on sale in all important districts of the county.

NATIVE COPPER STREAKS FOUND AT CROWN MINE

Seio—Seven streaks of native copper are said to have been exposed in cross-section work at the Crown mine on the Little North Fork of the Santiam river in the Elkhorn district during the winter. Ore carrying gold and silver also have been encountered, according to a report from the district this week.

Operations at the mine for several months have consisted principally of drifting eastward on the black wall vein from its conjunction with the new vein. At this point the former vein is reported about 30 feet wide between the walls. Drifting now is being done along the foot wall and rich native copper has been reported.

The face of the drift on the new vein, which continues beyond its junction with the black wall, shows copper mineralization with better gold values than any other ore yet found in the new vein drift, according to a report made this week in Seio by R. E. Peery, manager of the Crown mine.

Mr. Peery and A. E. Chilcote were in Portland this week to confer with parties interested in the development of the property. It is expected that J. Cleveland Haas, a prominent engineer of the northwest, will visit the mine this week for the purpose of consultation and advancement of plans of development and equipment.

Kyle Moore, foreman of the mine for four years, will resume his duties at the mine in the near future. It is expected Moore had charge of the tunnel during cross-sectioning, and since that time has had similar experience in a California mine. Peery reported much renewed activity also at the Amalgamated mine, one of the largest in the west. A large amount of new equipment has been added and the steam plant has been supplied by water power, which furnishes electricity.

for all power purposes in the mill. Flotation cells have been added, increasing the capacity of the daily run. An ore shoot 24 feet wide and of high grade is reported at the Amalgamated, and is being delivered to the mill for treatment. Eleven faces of ore have been opened up, and a sufficient amount is in sight to mill 100 tons daily for 50 years, according to reports. These ores bear lead, zinc, copper, gold and silver. The average ore is said to be 75 percent sulphide, which would cause a real mining stampede in most any well-known mine, it is asserted. The mill soon is to begin both night and day runs.

The winter in the Elkhorn district has been even more mild than in the valley. Peery stated, but there have been tremendous rains in the lower reaches of the Cascades. There is no snow in sight at the mines, he said.
