

PROFANE TALK TO CONSTABLE IS EXPENSIVE

Woodburn—Art Skirvin, after spending the week-end in the city jail, appeared in Judge Overton's court Monday morning and entered a plea of guilty to the charge of using abusive and profane language upon grounds used and kept as a public resort. He was fined \$25 with \$9.35 additional as costs and in default of payment was taken to the county jail. The offense was committed at Playmore park Saturday night and the "abusive and profane language" was used to Constable Uppendahl, who swore out the complaint.

George Foster, arrested for selling liquor to James Long, a minor 17 years of age, had his bail fixed at \$100, which was furnished. He is to appear for arraignment this week but the exact date has not been fixed.

Arthur F. Grable paid a fine of \$2.50 and costs of \$2 for operating a motor vehicle without a muffler. L. D. Clements, for operating a motor vehicle with a muffler cut out attached to the exhaust pipe, entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$5 and costs of \$2.50. He was taken to the county jail in default of payment.

James Riggi, Jr., arrested for driving with four persons in the driver's seat of his car, entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$5 and \$2.50 costs. In default of payment he was committed to the county jail.

SPECIAL ELECTION PLAN IS "KILLED"

Independence—At the March meeting of the city council funds were ordered paid to those who were granted 1934 beer licenses within the city. The council decided for January and February \$3.32 of the \$20 fee and in addition the \$5 allowed by the Knox law for recommendation of those to be licensed. Refunds were made to J. B. An ordinance was also passed by the council to kill the proposed special election to determine the wet and dry issue in the city. The supreme court decision upholding the Knox law made the special election a superfluous in the opinion of B. F. Swope, city attorney.

Another ordinance, known as No. 48, striking out section 1 of ordinance No. 201, striking out the prohibition of the sale of liquor of not more than one-half of 1 per cent in pool halls. This places the entire regulation under the Knox law.
