Several other persons, including Cairo's wife, his son John, and his daughter-in-law, Mrs. John Cairo, in addition to workmen employed at the plant, narrowly escaped injury. The elder Cairo and his son made their homes near the fireworks establishment.

The blast occurred while Cairo was mixing explosives to be used in the manufacture of fireworks. He had just sent his son from the building on an errand.

Must Quit Church If She Weds Bao Dai

Vatican City, March 13 (AP)—The 18 year old French convent girl who was chosen as the bride of the Emperor of Annam cannot marry the Indo-Chinese ruler and still remain a Catholic, it was disclosed semi-officially today.

The remains of the youthful Buddhist Bao Dai and Nguyen Huu-Hao, daughter of a wealthy merchant of Cochinchina, China, met with objections because the 21 year old potentate has declined to promise that their children shall be baptized Catholics.

Conditional Pardon For Vanderzander

Governor Meier today issued a conditional pardon to Thomas F. Vanderzander, serving a life prison sentence from Washington county for second degree murder.

Vanderzander was received at the prison October 27, 1923, after being found guilty of shooting Jacob Dahinden. Records show Vanderzander killed Dahinden when the latter refused him food. He was 16 years old at the time.

Authorities reported Vanderzander had been a model prisoner. He was paroled to A. H. Holmes of Forest Grove.

SLAP CAG RULE ON OFFICES BILL

Washington, March 13 (AP)—The house rules committee today approved a modified gag rule designed to send the independent offices appropriations bill to a conference with the senate in an attempt to work out a compromise on restoration of federal pay cuts and increased veterans' compensation.

Washington, March 13 (AP)—The legislative appropriation bill carrying \$17,448,993 mainly for congressional salaries, upkeep of the capitol, and the government printing office, was reported out to the house today by the appropriations committee.

Only one regular appropriation bill now remains in committee, the District of Columbia supply bill.

The legislative bill carried \$291,938 less than budget estimates. It provides for replacement of nine elevators in the capitol, carries \$4,000 for new rugs for representatives' offices, and proposes that four instead of two members of the house may be designated to attend funerals of deceased members. A number of other miscellaneous items are included.

GRANT'S PASS WILL PLAY SAM'S VALLEY

Medford, March 13 (AP)—Sam's Valley, secondary champions of Jackson county, and the Ashland high school basketball team will play a series of three games, the first at Medford, the second at Oregon Grant in the state tournament at Salem next week.

The basketball committee for the southern Oregon district this morning made a ruling to this effect. The committee is composed of the principals of the Grants Pass, Ashland and Medford schools.

The Sam's Valley and Ashland school coaches will confer today on the time and place for the title contest. One game will be played on the Sam's Valley floor, one on the Ashland floor, and the third game, if necessary on a neutral floor.

Medford school authorities this morning gave as their reason for severance of athletic relations with Ashland yesterday, inability to agree with Ashland school heads, "on the selection of any official for a school contest, be it football or debating."

Medford officials said, "the contention has extended over a long period of time and we worried of a constant controversy over trivialities."

FIVE INDICTED IN KIDNAPING PLOT

St. Louis, March 13 (AP)—Mrs. Nellie Tilton Muench, wife of Dr. Ludwig O. Muench, physician, and four men were indicted at suburban Clayton today on a charge of kidnaping Dr. I. D. Kelley for ransom April 20, 1931.

The men indicted are Felix McDonald, former convict, Bart Davis, Angelo Rosegrant, salesman, and John C. Johnson, negro tenant on a farm where Dr. Kelley was held captive after he was lured from his home on a fake sick call.

Mrs. Muench was widely known in St. Louis as proprietor of an exclusive dress shop which went bankrupt in 1928 with a loss of \$77,000 to creditors. She is also a member of a circle of musical devotees and her husband is an accomplished violinist.

The indictment followed an alleged expose of the kidnaping by Adolph Frieder, a 39-year-old former justice of the peace in Maplewood, a suburb, Fiedler implicated a woman and eight men, three of whom have been killed in gang feuds.

Head of Long-Bell Firm Seriously Ill

Kansas City, March 13 (AP)—R. A. Long, head of the huge Long-Bell lumber interests, was reported in critical condition at Menorah hospital today. A physician arrived at noon by plane from Dallas to treat the 60-year-old chairman of the one-time \$100,000,000 lumber concern. He was suffering from an intestinal obstruction.

KIWANIS TOLD OF COMMUNISM AS PRACTICED

Communism, not in theory but in practice, was presented in the various and complicated phases before the Kiwanis club Tuesday noon by M. R. Bacon, of Portland, member of the Portland police communism squad, who for six months was regarded as a member of the communist party, serving in official capacities as literature agent, secretarial positions and a district delegate before he was ready to expose the workings of the organization.

Prime objectives of the communist party are the abolition of private property, meaning state capitalism and the end of representative government; abolition of all religion and morality through the elimination of the marriage system, and equality of the races with intermarriage advocated and the negro promised an equal rating with other races and a government of his own, Bacon said. He quoted excerpts from communist literature to substantiate his remarks.

The program of the communist party is to assume leadership over unorganized groups with demands and slogans pertinent to the current conditions. These leaders, he said, appear as spokesmen for delegations appearing before relief bureaus and city or county committees, presenting "demands."

In connection with the Theodore Jones case (Klanist) Bacon said he was convicted of the murder of a railroad employee, Bacon said they had no personal interest in the individual but used it as a basis of a wide campaign to enroll negroes behind the league of struggle for negro rights. Bacon, who appeared as chief witness against Boloff, sentenced to ten years in the state prison for violation of the criminal syndicalism act, charged the Kiwanis with offering a parole from the bench with the provision that he return to Russia, which was refused because the party wished to capitalize upon his sentence.

The purpose of the party is to build for militant action when the time arrives, the speaker said. It works through the International Labor defense, unemployment council, control of organized industrial groups and everywhere attempts to foment unrest on the assumption that persons who are unemployed and hungry are easily organized for action. Every field is covered, particularly industry, with the overthrow of government the avowed purpose of the party, Bacon said.

In Russia it is working through the Soviet government with surplus to stimulate additional unemployment and unrest. There are in the twelfth district, comprising Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, with few in Alaska, a total of 2300 registered communists, Bacon declared.

LOCAL CHESS CLUB WILL MEET DAK

Dr. George H. Swift, secretary of the Salem Chess club, reports that there has been a good sign-up of members tonight to contest Arthur Dake, international chess wizard, who will put on an exhibition at St. Paul's parish house at 7:30 o'clock.

He plans to play 25 of the best local chess club reports that in a series of games, to also put on a blindfold tournament, and after the games will give a lecture on the fundamentals of chess. Anybody interested is invited to be present, a small charge being put on to defray expenses of Dake to Salem.

Dake, a Portland man, was one of the runners up in the national tournament in Detroit and has been selected as one of four to make up a team in an international tournament.

MRS. ROOSEVELT VISITS ISLANDERS

San German, Puerto Rico, March 13 (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt set a breathless pace for her companions again today in a tour of the Puerto Rico needlework district.

An 8 a. m. start from San German, where she spent the night, a picnic lunch by roadside, a considerable pause at Ponce; a 5 o'clock reception at San Juan—these were mere highlights on the day's full program.

The first lady of the United States, heralded by Spanish cries, headed what had the appearance of a triumph procession through the Arecibo and other points yesterday.

Enthusiastic throngs hailed her everywhere. A group of ruralists barred a mountain pass until they could teach Mrs. Roosevelt's automobile and present wild lilacs.

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
