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TARIFF BILL IS BUGABOO FOR SMALL GROUP

Washington, March 13. Some trouble for the Senate is being caused today that President Roosevelt is asking them to commit political suicide in supporting his request for authority to negotiate reciprocal tariff agreements.

A small group of democrats is preparing to offer limiting amendments to the administration tariff bill if it is brought to a Senate vote at this session. The consensus of opinion is that Mr. Roosevelt will insist upon unqualified authority despite murmurs from within his own party.

An amendment being discussed now by back bench senate democrats would require submission of trade agreements to Congress for approval before they became effective. It is proposed that a reciprocal agreement be approved by a mere majority vote in contrast to the two-thirds majority which is required to ratify a treaty.

Senator William E. Borah, Rep., Idaho, former chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, is not satisfied with a majority decision. He believes the agreement will be treated in a legal sense and not ratified by the customary two-thirds senate vote. Borah has expressed the opinion privately that to refuse to submit these agreements to the senate would process unconstitutional. There is not much support for that theory even among republican opponents of reciprocal trade agreement authority.

But senate republicans would be expected to vote almost unanimously for a limiting amendment such as some democrats contemplate. There are 35 senate republicans and even if 30 of them supported amendments to the administration bill it still could pass unless 19 or more democrats bolted the administration. Desertion on that scale is not likely.

participate. Further arrangements for the banquet will be laid at the club's next meeting, March 17.

Executive, finance and decoration committees have been named in addition to one to draft a constitution and by-laws.

Creation of the club brings the number of active democratic organizations here up to three, the others being the Young Democrats' league and the Martin-for-Governor club, organized last week, which will hold a dinner meeting at the Marion hotel Friday night.

Although there is some slight lull in the scramble of candidates for gubernatorial honors following the announcement of Governor Meier that he will not seek re-election, due to the fact that most aspirants who have not already announced are taking time to study the situation and lay their lines, there is renewed activity in the field of potential secretaries of state. Particularly is this true on the republican side of the fence.

William McGilchrist, Salem real estate and securities broker, continues to give serious consideration to the insistence of friends that he become a candidate for the republican nomination for the office vacated by Hal E. Hoss. While McGilchrist mulls the idea over in his head and keeps his ear to the ground, interested friends are said to have secured the pledges necessary for a campaign fund from local merchants and others interested in seeing Salem represented on the state board of control.

Also, P. J. Stadelman, who upon the occasion of his appointment as successor to Hoss expressed an inclination to remain in the office only until the end of the year, is said to have undergone a change of heart and now considers the idea of being a candidate himself. The harmony prevailing on the board of control since his appointment in the place of bickering and discord between the governor and State Treasurer Rufus Holman which Stadelman was led to expect, is said to have altered his estimation of the job.

The failure of Earl Snell, speaker of the house, to announce his expected candidacy is construed by some to indicate that he is more inclined to make the race for governor, but his closer friends and associates still predict that he will file for the secretaryship when the time becomes ripe.

Carle Abrams, former secretary of the board of control and the first republican in the filed for secretary of state, continues quietly with his campaigning.

Meanwhile the boom which started in Lane county last week for Elbert Bede, editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel and reading clerk of the house of representatives for many years, daily is assuming greater proportions. Just now Bede's boosters are making an active bid for support of the Cottage Grove Sentinel's associates in the legislative association. A circular letter signed by Thomas Nelson, publisher of the Junction City Times and addressed to all upstate editors tells the story of the newspaper canvass being made in Bed
