B. B. Gesner Guest of Honor

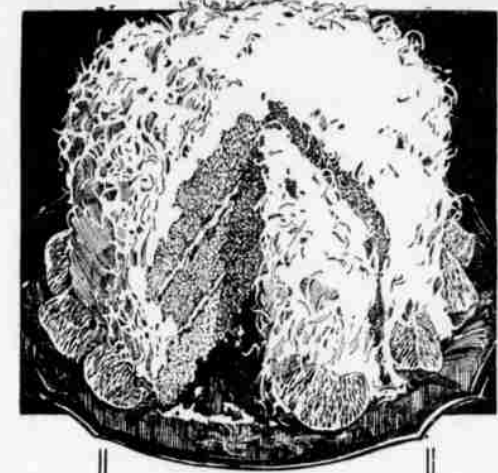
