LIVELY BOUTS EXPECTED FROM MANY ENTRANTS

Simon pure wrestlers from several cities of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will engage in the northwest Y.M.C.A. championships at the local Y Saturday afternoon and evening. Entries have been received from Boise, Tacoma, Portland, Seattle and Salem. It is possible others may be furnished in time to get in the tournament.

Cincinnati, April 13 (AP)—Indictments charging second degree murder in a double killing in a cafe here March 11 were returned today by the county grand jury against Jack Reynolds, 38, of Covington, Ky. claimant to the welterweight wrestling championship, his wife, Alice Reynolds, and David Polinsky.

The San Francisco Missions loomed today as the challenger for first place position in the Pacific coast league. The Missions rose to second place yesterday by taking their third straight game from the San Francisco Seals, 2 to 1.

Sam Gibson, the Seals' ace hurler, allowed Gabby Street's aggregation only six hits while his team mates were collecting nine, but the Missions were able to bunch the bingles where they counted. Ervin Bantz was relieved on the Mission mound by Wayne Osborne in the fifth inning when the Seals earned their lone tally on three singles.

Los Angeles protected its position at the top of the standings by downing Hollywood for the third straight time in another 2 to 1 contest that was a pitching duel between Fay Thomas of the Angels and Tom Sheehan of the Stars. Thomas allowed six hits, Sheehan seven. Outfielder Smedley Jolley hit a home run for Hollywood's lone score, and first baseman Jim Oglesby accounted for one of the Angels' runs by another homer.

After both teams were held scoreless through seven innings, Portland collected two runs in the eighth and four in the ninth to defeat Sacramento, 6 to 3.

Chicago, April 13 (AP)—Jack Medica, University of Washington sophomore decided to leave the women's national A.A.U. indoor swimming championships exclusively to the girls today as he filled out applications for one world's and three American distance records.

He bettered the world's mark of 4:47 by swimming the 400 meters in 4:43 Wednesday; and last night he eclipsed American records in the 800, 900 and 1000-yard free styles.

- 1—Scrape off all the food particles adhering to the dishes and utensils with either a spatula or a rubber plate scraper, then rinse under the hot water faucet.
- 2—Wash in the following order: Glass, silver, china, earthenware, grates, cutlery, tinware, ironware.
- 3—Prepare two dishpans full of water in hot as the hand can bear. Make a soapy suds solution in the right-hand pan.
- 4—Wash dishes in the right-hand pan and rinse in the left-hand pan. Change the water as soon as it becomes perceptibly dirty. Keep adding hot water to rinse pan to prevent cooling.
- 5—Wipe the dishes with clean, dry towels, keeping like dishes together.
- 6—Wash the dishcloths and dishcloths. Wash and dry the dishpan. Clean the sink and wipe all around with a sink cloth.
