The Oregon State college club eight, coached by E. A. Stephens of this city, defeated the Portland Rowing club eight over a mile course on the Willamette river in Portland Wednesday by six feet. Portland, protected by the west bank of the river from a west wind, rowed a high stroke of 33 or 34 and led the Beaver crew by a length at the half mile. THOMAS CHUCKS EXCELLENT BALL AS ANGELS WIN

Kept in the background most of last year by the more brilliant performances of his three great Los Angeles teammates, Buck Newsom, Dick Ward and LeRoy Herrmann, big Pay Thomas finished strong to win his last seven 1933 starts and this season is undisputed head man of the Angel pitching show.

The husky right hander had little trouble beating Hollywood, 12-4 yesterday for his 10th win of the year and 18th consecutive victory, one more than the former Coast League record. Thomas allowed the Stars 9 hits but had little to worry about as the Angels bombarded Vance Page and George Saltzberger for 13, including Gilly Campbell's 11th homer of the season, Gene Lillard's 16th and Jim Oglesby's 9th.

While the champions marked up their fourth straight win over Hollywood to clinch the series, the second place Missions suffered their second defeat of the week at the hands of the San Francisco Seals, 3-2, and dropped 12 games behind Los Angeles.

Outfielder Elmer Funk's double followed by Lenny Backer's single brought in the winning Seal tally and gave LeRoy Herrmann, San Francisco mound ace, his 10th 1934 victory. Hollis Thurston's pass to Backer in the second inning resulted in a Seal run and proved to be the winning margin. The Seals moved past Hollywood into a third place tie with Sacramento.

At Seattle Howard Craghead blanked Sacramento with four blows as the Indians evened the series, 3-0. A hefty circuit wallop by Mike Hunt, Seattle outfielder, drove in all three of the Indian runs in the sixth.

Oakland and Portland were rained out.

by Matt Ryckman, when he refused to plant fish in Oswego lake because it is not entirely open to the public.

Ryckman said he was about to plant large numbers of bass, crappies and other spiny-rayed fishes in the lake when he received protests from sportsmen that they could not gain access to the lake without paying the owners of private property for the privilege.

There are a number of road-ends leading to the lake which are open to the public, and it is possible to rent boats with which to fish the entire lake, but the greatest area of the shoreline is either devoted to private homes or is so precipitous as to be impossible to fish.
