

## MINOR MATTERS GET ATTENTION OF COUNCILMEN

Silverton—With the exception of three minor matters considered, the principal feature of the regular meeting of the Silverton councilmen was taken up in discussing the cooperation of the city in allowing the gravel which is to be removed from the city municipal bathing pool to be hauled to the airport for placing there as needed. The three minor matters considered were the closing of the block to protect children attending the Silverton children school conducted by Rev. Ernest G. Larson for two weeks; the announcement that the subscription price for infected earwigs to rid the town of the pests had been raised and the bugs would be here within a few days, and the discussion of the successor to Oscar Gander as care-taker of the Silverton streets with favor being given Theodore Grace.

Gordon Johnson of Portland, engineer for the SERRA project at the airport, was present and explained in detail how much work could be done by the government in transporting the gravel the mile to the airport from the pool. He explained the cost to the city as 75 cents an hour for the hire of trucks, with an additional wage for the driver, making a maximum of \$400 for the work, with the SERRA furnishing the labor.

The council members voted to consider favorably the cooperative plan and the mayor instructed the park committee, composed of Wilson, Anderson and Range, to ask for sealed bids on the mechanical work of cleaning the pool to be handed in by Monday, June 11, at which time the council will meet specially to open the bids. Engineer Johnson is to notify the department of commerce of the decision of the city.

Johnson explained that Silverton airport would be equipped with a north and south, as well as an east and west, runway, that it will be leveled, tiled and graveled for drainage and, in all, be benefited several thousand dollars worth in repairs. He specified that the SERRA project at the airport must have gravel and that this would be an ideal opportunity to dispose of the gravel from the pool.

A number of ideas were suggested from the work being done on the airport at Albany under similar conditions.
