

PEST CHECKED BY PARASITES TWO YEARS OLD

Dallas—The early parasite introduced into Dallas two years ago seems to have been of material help in holding this pest in check. A telephone survey of 40 homes in Dallas Monday showed that most of the folks figure that there are not nearly so many earwigs as there were two years ago.

The survey Monday was conducted by the county agent's office and 31 women reported that there were not nearly so many earwigs in 1932 and possibly 1933. Seven home makers reported more earwigs and two stated that they didn't know whether there were more or less. One or two of the women who reported more earwigs than heretofore stated that they weren't bothered at all in 1932 so it is possible that the earwigs have just spread out to their place. Every section of Dallas was covered in the list, who were called on the phone Monday.

Three weeks or a month ago it looked like there was going to be a great lot of earwigs this year but in the words of one of the parties interviewed "Something has happened to them." This indicates that the parasite is doing its work.

A common comment offered by those called up was that most of the earwigs they noticed this year are small and puny. This is another indication that the parasite is working on them. It is expected that most of these puny ones will die.

"We are receiving a good many calls from farm women this year on control methods for earwigs," states County Agent J. R. Beck. Before this year most of the calls were from town women. This perhaps indicates that the earwigs have gradually spread out to the country districts.

JERSEY JAUNT HUGE SUCCESS THROUGH POLK

Dallas—Good weather, a good crowd and a good program featured the 17th annual Jersey jubilee held in the Independence district Tuesday. Classification of the two purebred herds owned by M. N. Tibbles and L. A. Hulburt by Professor F. W. Atkinson of the University of Idaho was the feature events of the day.

"Polk county leads the entire country in record-breaking performances of Jersey cattle," stated Lynn Copeland of the American Jersey Cattle club who was a visitor at the jubilee Tuesday. Polk county Jersey breeders are now taking the lead in having their herds classified according to a new feature of Jersey breed promotion work.

M. N. Tibbles has eight cows in milk. All of them were submitted for classification. Two were graded very good, three good plus, and three good. Mr. Tibbles' herd is outstanding for production records. All of the eight cows have had an official record placed on them and the average production of these eight at varying ages is 34 pounds of milk. Some of the records covered only 10 months and others were for the entire 12 months.

There were 17 milking cows in the L. A. Hulburt herd which were classified in the afternoon. Five were judged in the very good group, six as good plus, four as good and two of them were judged fair. Professor Atkinson used the Hulburt herd as a demonstration for the crowd of a hundred or more people who attended the festivities. Besides explaining the work he gave them an opportunity to pass their own opinion on some of the animals.

The luncheon hour was held in the park of the city of Independence. Visitors were present from every Willamette valley county as well as several out-of-state visitors. This was the second county jubilee of the week and other Willamette valley counties are holding similar celebrations each day of the week including Friday.

The Jersey classification work is aimed to give buyers an idea of the quality and confirmation of a cow that they can't see. In other words, so that an Oregon man can know what type of a cow he is purchasing when he buys her in Missouri, because the rating given her in this classification work is stamped on the registration papers. There are six classes. The best grade is excellent followed in order by very good, good plus, good, fair and poor. It is noticeable that none of the herds in Polk county were classified as poor but on the other hand none of them received the highest rating of excellent.

SHORTAGE VISIONED IN RURAL AFFAIRS

Dallas—Cherry picking and haying are making demands on the reemployment service office here at the present time and it appeared Tuesday as if there may be a shortage especially in the former seasonal occupation.

Men are subject to more call in this line than women and children although the likes and dislikes of the growers vary. In some orchards there is a heavy percentage of youngsters doing the picking but in others it is quite the reverse. There are also two calls listed for white fir wood cutters which up to the present time remain unfilled. These calls are for fourteen men and cutting will be close to the county seat.
