

COYOTES GIVE HUNTER THRILL IN SCIO AREA

Scio—The cunning instincts of a coyote evaded trail hounds and rifle bullets on numerous occasions in the Rodgers mountain area, a few miles southeast of Scio. At one time, only a few weeks ago, one of these wary little canine marauders, hotly pursued by relentless hounds that bayed and trailed in all directions, dashed within a few feet of Bill Brenner of Scio, who was armed for the animal but was heavily clad against the cold rain that was falling and could not use his weapon before the coyote disappeared in the thickets.

A few days ago, however, the climatic conditions were more favorable to hounds and hunters. Repeated reports of depredations of the predatory little animals spurred the hunters to redouble their efforts in quest of the poultry and sheep thieves. Cecil Bates of the Shelburn section near Scio loaded his hounds into a car and made for Rodgers mountain upon report of a hot tip on the coyote situation.

The dogs had no trouble in picking up the trail of a coyote. In fact, it is stated by men who have studied the habits of coyotes that they have regular trails or "runs" that are followed when pursued. Dogs and men were stationed at intervals along this rendezvous run, while other trailers were given the fresh scent of a coyote with directions to find him. The drive was on.

Within less than an hour the timbered butte reached the hounds' baying that reverberated through the haunts of coyotes and cougars. As the busy hounds spent their strength on the trail in bush and boulder, fresh trailers were ready to be unleashed at an opportune time.

A piercing rifle shot was the signal that the chase was either concluded or that a gun was belching lead in the direction of the hunted animal. The signal meant both—Bates' dogs had overtaken the coyote and chased it to gunshot range of Bates, who brought it down at the first unerring aim.

Packs of hounds held in reserve were not liberated, as one coyote in a single quest was considered all that could reasonably be expected at that time. However, it is believed there are many more of the animals in that immediate section. Frequent raids, with an occasional catch, have been carried on and will be continued at the instance of farmers who have sustained sheep and poultry losses from cougars and coyotes.

G. E. Rodgers, pioneer farmer and stockman, for whose family Rodgers mountain was so named, recently has found lamb with several windpipes. Mr. Rodgers is of the opinion it is the work of coyotes. Others in that locality are finding carcasses of young sheep that have apparently been killed by predatory wild animals.
