

ARTS LEAGUE TO MAKE STUDY OF NEW SUBJECTS

Activities directed toward social service with a view toward the elimination of prejudice are planned for the programs of the Salem Arts League for the season commencing in September, according to the policy outlined by the new president, Perry Prescott Reigelman, at the meeting of the executive council in the fireplace room of the Salem public library Tuesday evening.

With the idea of social service as a keynote for the year, a new section is planned, tentatively called "Social Psychology," which group will be under the leadership of Roy Hewitt, former dean of the Willamette university college of law, who took work in psychology under G. Stanley Hall, noted psychologist.
