

EGG MARKET ALONG COAST HOLDING WELL

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Butter prices were unchanged today. Market situation for eggs continues good within the local sector and in fact along the coast generally. Portland prices remain the lowest of the leading markets of the country.

Trading in the cheese market remains firm and with well sustained prices in practically all sections of the country. Speculative interest continues rather keen and especially in the east.

Higher prices are being named for strawberries here with a shortage of total offerings and an especial scarcity of large quality fruit. Other berries are about steady.

Small catch of salmon is reported by coast fishermen and local receipts are decreasing. Market on halibut is about steady around 15c for medium and 13c for chicken.

Leading growers confirm severe damage to the current crop as a result of aphid and Hessian fly, which are said to have destroyed much of the bloom. Crop is estimated about half of normal.

There is a firm tone for veal and hogs, steadiness for lambs while canner cows and bulls are in good call with cutter cows and beef a trifle slower.

Local pea market is active with supplies liberal and price down a fraction.

Asparagus market is weak with prices shaded.

Good lettuce continues very scarce.

Hot-house tomatoes are firmly priced to 12c for 10c.

Green beans are very weak, dragging and with a lower tendency to prices.

Spinach is very scarce and higher priced.

PROFIT TAKING LOWERS STOCKS AFTER ADVANCE

New York, June 13 (AP)—An abrupt, unexplained decline in wheat unsettled the stock market this afternoon after early strength.

The list which had been fractions to more than 2 points higher turned irregularly lower. Wheat closed at losses of 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cents and other grains made smaller declines. Profit-taking accounted for the drop as the market otherwise was devoid of favorable or unfavorable news.

Sugar and cocoa markets came into prominence. The former saw the May, 1935, position at the highest level for any futures contract since April, 1930. In cocoa trading was the most active of the year.

Silver, rubber, copper and hides futures rose, while silk and cotton declined. Bonds were irregular with U. S. issues higher and German loans down. The dollar was mixed in a narrow range with the mark rallying after an early break.

Western Union, whose April report was a disappointment in the financial community, closed off a point. Other communications eased from their highs.

American Sugar refining featured a strong sugar group, making a new high for the year at 61 1/2, up 1 1/2 point from the previous close. Great Western Sugar at one time was up 1 1/2 per cent.

Steel were firm spots early, but they eased later. U. S. Steel reached 43, then dipped a point to its previous close of 42. Others reacted correspondingly. The strike prospect is still a big uncertainty despite stalwart efforts of the administration to arrive at a settlement.

Coppers firmed in the morning. Kennecott made a new high at 23 1/2, up 1/2, and others scored fractional advances in active trading. The group turned down with the general list before the close.

Stock sales approximated 880,000 shares against 950,000 shares yesterday. Curb sales were 152,000 shares against 169,000 shares yesterday.

Dow-Jones preliminary closing averages showed industrial 98.75, off .03; railroad 45.55, up .02; utility 24.43, up .02.

Kuensting Packs Ensilage In Ground

An experiment in packing ensilage in a pit in the ground by F. G. Kuensting, Marion county farmer, was reported today.

Last fall when Kuensting had more than enough fodder to fill his barrel silo, he packed the remainder in an unlined pit. Neighbors predicted moisture would spoil the feed. The hole was 10 feet deep and eight feet in diameter. The ensilage was covered with a two-foot layer of dirt. Kuensting started feeding from the pit in late May. The ensilage was undamaged, he said, and was, in fact, superior to that from the silo. This year he will erect a shed roof over his pit and fence it to keep stock from running across.

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CAMPAIN IN OKLAHOMA HAS CIRCUS TREND

Oklahoma City (AP)—Oklahoma's 1934 political campaign would have been worth millions to P. T. Barnum.

Combining all the elements of jazz, slapstick comedy, oratory good and bad, weird economic theories, and bizarre campaign tactics, the political showdowns are presenting hilarious entertainment for the people.

For weeks, Gov. W. H. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray has been "on the reservation," touring the country.

In Don Quixote fashion, he has tackled a score of political adversaries, launching his own ticket for major state offices.

Lieut. Gov. Robert Burns, enemy of Murray, has a blaring, 130-piece band to do his trumpeting in the gubernatorial race and Corporation Commissioner J. C. (Iron Jack) Walton has revived his brass band of 1922 fame for his campaign.

Attorney General J. Berry King, another gubernatorial aspirant, uses a phonograph mounted on his automobile and several records of jazz, crowd-gathering tunes.

Dr. George Long, Tulsa dentist, brother of Louisiana's Kingfish, has a sound truck, and camp outfit to tour the state in whirlwind fashion. His party sleeps in a tent while on the road.

Campbell Russell, former corporation commissioner and democratic candidate for congressman, uses a "half pit" car and loud speaker in a dynamic tour.

State Senator Tom Waldrep, a democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, passes out heavily perfumed campaign cards and carries a road show with him.

Two "Will Rogers" are running for congress-at-large, both democrats, one the teacher incumbent, the other a rustic truck driver. Neither are comedians.

Gomer Smith, another candidate for governor, is the pioneer user of noise devices to drum up a crowd. Ever since he was defeated for the United States senate two years ago he has been "driving along the section lines" with a phonograph and loudspeaker, speaking to as few as 20 farmers and as many as several thousand, at a time.

**CHERRIANS TO GO
TO ROSE CARNIVAL**

Cherrians going to Portland Thursday to take part in the annual rose festival parade will make the trip by the regular northbound Southern Pacific train leaving Salem at 10:17 o'clock instead of a special train, it was decided at a meeting of the organization Tuesday night. Sixty uniformed men will be in the line of march and will report to the fleet at the Multnomah stadium at 1:30 o'clock with the parade moving half an hour later. The marching group, wearing tuxedos, straw hats, white t-shirts and shoes and black ties will

be under the command of Carl Gabrielson. The float escort will be garbed entirely in white uniforms. Headquarters will be maintained at the Portland hotel.

A special attendance committee was named by King Bing George Arbuckle, composed of Ray Bone-steale, chairman; Kenneth Perry, Willis Clark and Donald Deekebach. To speed up the cleanup of rose festival buttons, sold to finance the cost of the float, R. W. Niles, general chairman, and J. T. Delaney were
