SWIMMING POOL IMPROVEMENT IS VALUABLE ASSET

Silverton—A number of large picnic groups have been postponing their parties until the cleaning of gravel from the municipal pool in the park has been effected. The season is at least five weeks earlier this year for swimming, but the gravel has stayed in the pool up to times of a normal swimming season.

E. H. Itchner of Molalla promises a clear dive by the first of July and is at work on the contract that was awarded him at the special meeting of the city council Monday evening of this week.
