

NEW DIRECTORS VALLEY SCHOOL BOARDS CHOSEN

Hayesville—The annual school election of school district No. 99 was held at the school house Monday evening with Albert Stettler, chairman of the board of directors in the chair.

Horace Smith was re-elected to serve as clerk of the district for the fiscal year and H. C. Robertson will be the new director to fill the vacancy of Albert Stettler, retiring member. The board of directors for the new year will consist of Charles Andersen, chairman, Dr. Fred Ellis and H. C. Robertson.

The budget as adopted by the board members was read and approved. The financial report showed that the district was entirely out of debt, the school bonds being all paid out this year, all warrants taken care of and a substantial amount still on deposit in the bank.

On voting for two directors for the board of education for Marion county, Michael Weinacht for zone 1 and Frank Hynes for zone 2 were the choice of this district.

Aumsville—At the annual school meeting Monday evening it was voted to run buses in the non-high school districts adjoining this district the vote was in favor 77, opposed 16.

Dave Eastburn was elected director for three years succeeding Fred Garbe, who has served for five years. The vote was Eastburn 50, Garbe 41. For clerk Mrs. Margaret Martin, who was clerk last year, and Mrs. Bessie Calvin were nominated. Mrs. Martin received 53 votes, Mrs. Calvin 35. The financial condition of the school is in excellent condition according to the financial report.

Hubbard—At the annual school meeting Monday evening Earl Louey was elected director for three years to succeed Waldo F. Brown, and D. E. McArthur was re-elected clerk for one year. Other board members for the ensuing year are George Grimes, chairman, and Garfield Voget. The meeting was well attended, 62 votes being cast. Satisfaction was expressed with the manner in which the school had been conducted for the past year.

Albany—J. K. Weatherford, Albany attorney, and A. G. Senders, local business man, were elected Monday to the Albany school board. Voting was light, the candidates being unopposed. Weatherford has been a member of the board for 50 years, and was for 40 years a member of the state board of higher education.

Union Hill—At the regular school meeting held in the Union Hill schoolhouse Monday evening the following were elected as new directors: Mrs. Belle Heary to serve for three years and Verner Scott to fill the two-year term of Ralph Mott, who has moved from the district.

Wacoma—The annual school election for district 133 held at the schoolhouse Monday evening, at 8 o'clock resulted as follows: Joe Melthof was re-elected director for three years, and Ray Jones elected director for two years. Mrs. Homer Egan was re-elected clerk. A new water system for the school was discussed. The foundation has been laid for the new two-room schoolhouse under construction in the Eldridge district. Amel Cramer has charge of the work.

Marion—At the annual school election held Monday evening, J. L. Calaven was elected to succeed Carl Olson as director and Mrs. Cora Smith was re-elected clerk. The financial condition of the district was reported as excellent.

West Station—At the regular school election held Monday evening, C. T. Darley was elected on the school board. Harry Stewart is outgoing director. Leonard Walker was re-elected school clerk.

Mt. Angel—Fred J. Schwab was re-elected on the school board and John Diehl re-elected clerk at a meeting of the school board Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at St. Mary's school auditorium. There were 408 who cast ballots at the election of the two directors from Zone 1 and Zone 2. Returns were as follows: Michael Weinacht 481; W. P. Collard, 1 from Zone 1; Frank Hynes 296 and L. J. Chapin 2, from Zone 2.

Rickreall—At the annual meeting of school district No. 26 held in the high school building Monday evening Bayard Findley was elected director for a term of three years to succeed S. H. Robinson who declined reelection. Mrs. Jessie Burch, who gave a detailed report of her year's stewardship was unanimously re-elected clerk for one year. Warren Burch and John Crippen are the two holdovers, the latter succeeding Mr. Robinson as chairman.

Only fifteen votes were cast. Owing to the present heavy work the

clerk's salary was voted raised from \$25 to \$30 a year.

The question of whether or not the district continue with the training school was left for the board to decide.

West Salem—There was a school meeting held Monday evening in the schoolhouse for the purpose of electing a director, a clerk and a representative on the transportation board.

There was a very small attendance and the session a quiet one. L. M. Hill was re-elected director for a three-year period and Mrs. Floyd DeLapp was re-elected clerk. The matter of a representative on the transportation board was discussed and voted on but the question of whom to vote for was not clearly understood. The vote finally went for the candidate in Zone 2, George W. Chapman was the presiding officer.

Turner—A comparatively small crowd attended the annual school meeting Monday afternoon for Turner district No. 79, J. E. Whitehead, Jr., was unanimously re-elected school director for a term of three years and Donald S. Riches succeeded Mrs. Moe H. Palmer as clerk of the school board. Other business matters were taken up and a report of decrease in warrant indebtedness about one-half during the past school year. Other board members are Stanley Riches and Fred Mitchell.

Mill City—At the annual school board election held Monday evening at the local grade school building, D. B. Hill was re-elected as clerk for the coming year. Dr. W. W. Allen was re-elected as director for a three-year term.

Roberts—At the annual school meeting Leonard H. Ziehlke was re-elected director and Mrs. Mabel Higgins clerk. Michael Weinacht received 14 votes, T. P. Collard 21, L. J. Chapin 20 and Frank Hynes 15.

The clerk's report showed that district No. 14 is now out of debt. Fred Wied was elected director for three years and E. E. Howell was re-elected clerk for one year.

Talbot—The Talbot school district No. 136 held its annual school meeting at the schoolhouse Monday afternoon. The budget was read and accepted. D. E. Turnidge was re-elected director to serve three years and Mrs. D. E. Blinson was re-elected clerk for the coming year.

Sidney—The school meeting of Sidney district No. 72 was held at the school house Monday evening. The budget was read and accepted. Mrs. John Zehner was elected director for three years and Ernest Todd was elected clerk.

Albany—Mr. and Mrs. Chester A. Lyon, who conduct the Big Brother farm near Lebanon, will bring the annual Big Sister group to the farm June 30. The 23 girls for whom they care at this time are all underprivileged children from Portland homes where the parents are unable to pay for their care and training.

Most of them are sisters of the boys cared for each summer at the Big Brother farm, founded by Mr. and Mrs. Lyon 21 years ago. Work among the girls was started ten years later.

Training at the farm includes mental, physical and especially moral development. The welfare of each girl is looked after upon her return to Portland.

Monmouth Rod and Gun Club Organized

AGRICULTURAL TOUR MADE ON PRAIRIES

Silverton—With scores of out-of-state guests of the Willamette valley commenting on the excellent appearance of the early farm crops along the Salem-Silverton roads, a trip through the Central Howell prairie Sunday and a number of inquiries proved that the visitors were right and probably no finer production any place is evidenced this season than on the farms in this community.

Hay balers by five firms are busy in the clover, vetch and oat hay. Roth Brothers, the Simmons baler, A. E. Kuempel and the Holt machine. Hay is running twice the crop of former years, making from 2½ to 4½ tons per acre. Henry Roth had baled 100 tons of clover. The clover fields are beautifully green toward the second growth which will make a splendid seed crop for the fall. A. E. Gower's average growth of clover is over 18 inches high. Albert Lemura's oat and vetch hay probably will carry off the production honors of the season per acre. The hay stands over 5½ feet high and is being cut the first of the week. One farmer suggested a U. S. charter of a train to ship some of the surplus to the mid-west. Cuts promise a fine crop, but wheat is about half the average.

EARWIGS START DRIVE ON CLAN FOR WOODBURN

Woodburn—Ten thousand parasite earwigs have arrived in Woodburn and were distributed by Stanley Woodward, Robert H. Scott and Mr. and Mrs. Carl Briggs on the properties of those who have contributed to the fund of \$145 for their purchase. The distribution was made as evenly as possible according to the amount contributed, those who had contributed \$1 receiving from 50 to 60 earwigs, and others in proportion.

Each infected earwig dies and leaves behind it a grub which hatches into a fly and this fly stings another earwig which also becomes infected, and the process continues indefinitely or until all the earwigs available are dead, after which the flies disappear. People are advised not to kill any earwigs on their property as they might be one of the infected ones, no difference in appearance being noticeable. The spread of the destroyers is rapid and whether or not the parasite earwigs have been placed on your property they will visit you and keep up the work of destruction. According to Stanley Woodward, who was the instigator and chief worker in this plan of destruction, by next year this time the town and vicinity should be entirely free from earwigs.
