

### MYSTERY FILM OFFERS THRILLS MOVIE PATRONS

If you enjoy sitting on the edge of your chairs, and if you enjoy being left completely in the dark while trying to solve a most baffling murder mystery, don't fail to see the new Metro-Godeyn-Mayer-Cosmopolitan picture, "The Thin Man," which opens Friday at the Elsinore theater.

"The Thin Man" is the story of Nick Charles, an ex-detective who is Sherlock Holmes, S. S. Van Dine and all other crack detectives rolled into one.

It tells of three murders which involved Charles, against his will, with the unusual Wynant family. His method of solving the crimes provides one of the most exciting and unusual climaxes of all detective pictures.

William Powell plays Nick Charles. Myrna Loy appears as his happy-go-lucky wife, Nora, and Maureen O'Sullivan carries off honors with her successful handling of the part of Dorothy Wynant.

### CHALIAPIN WILL REBUILD FORTUNE

London (AP)—The great Chaliapin, who has made two fortunes and lost them, soon will be able to buy the peace his heart desires.

Within two years, probably much earlier, the lowering Russian also will sing his last opera and retire into a little Austrian Tyrol village to become a gentleman-farmer.

Feodor Chaliapin, the shoemaker's son whose voice has thrilled audiences the world over for more than 42 years, now is 62—an elderly man, tired of his conquests, wanting simplicity.

The first time Chaliapin lost his fortune was in the Russian revolution. The next time it was the Wall Street crash which took 80 per cent. of his wealth.

Starting again at 60, he now is a wealthy man again, with a beautiful house in Paris, a villa at St. Jean de Laux, property in California and now has an Austrian place at Kitzbuehel.

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### Battle Looms Over Possession Of Child

Fresno, June 21 (AP)—A court battle over custody of a 6-year-old child loomed here Wednesday when the father, Orin Reeder of Klamath Falls, Oregon, filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus and the child's grandmother, Mrs. Zettie L. Chapman of Fresno asked guardianship papers awarding her custody of Barbara Jean Reeder.

Reeder alleges the child is being unlawfully detained by the grandmother. Mrs. Chapman alleges the child's mother, Mrs. Mildred Los Reeder Birk, died recently in Watsonville and had obtained custody of the child recently in Oakland when she was granted an annulment of her marriage to Reeder. Mrs. Chapman also contends that she obtained consent of Nicholas Birk of Watsonville, former husband of the child's mother, to the legal adoption of Barbara Jean.

### SNAKE SCARE CAUSES DEATH

Austin, Tex. (AP)—Half the people who die every year after being bitten by snakes are scared to death, and not actually killed by the snakes, in the opinion of G. E. S. Torrt, who makes a business of raising reptiles and extracting their venom for scientists.

To prove that his side is more than untested theory, Torrt points to the fact that he himself is still alive, and has been bitten several times. While going about the ticklish business of holding a snake by the jaws, sticking his finger in its mouth, and "milking" the poison from the reptile's venom ducts, Torrt occasionally is bitten. When such accidents occur, he calmly cuts the wound and sucks it. Before long he is ready to work on another snake.

This expert also believes that snakes really are friendly creatures and won't bite anyone unless they are hurt or scared. Treat them with respect and don't make them nervous, and there's little danger of attack, he says.

Moscow (AP)—The Soviet Union's spring drive against "hooliganism" is under way and prices have been set on various evils and annoying acts.

Each region makes its own "price list"—seriously, a set of fines—and some of them are amusing. They read like an index to "Peck's Bad Boy."

In the Saralinsky region, for instance, a lad with a bent for mischief can dig holes in the parks, or stretch logs across roads for 100 roubles. Or, for the same price, he may frighten the horses of some unfortunate driver.

Other acts for which fines of varying amounts may be assessed are listed thus: reasonless shooting in the streets, throwing stones at passers-by, distributing pornographic pictures and stretching wire across sidewalks to trip pedestrians.

Washington (AP)—The greatest and most disastrous strike epidemic in American history was forecast

last March by General Hugh B. Johnson, NRA administrator. From motor assembly line to freight caboose, labor is restless. Major strikes have been avoided. Blood has flowed in scattered minor disputes.

Longshoremen, textile operatives, automobile workers, railwaymen and the vast, sweaty host of the

steel mills are on the verge of strike or near it. Dispute centers most frequently on Section 7-A of the National Industrial Recovery Act which guarantees to labor the right of collective bargaining. The Administration has temporized in interpreting the provision.
