

# PHONE PEOPLE SCIO DISTRICT TALK PROJECT

Scio—About 30 people attended the called meeting of the Scio Mutual Telephone association in this city in the L.O.O.F. building. The special meeting was called by the board of directors "for the purpose of reorganizing the association and placing it on a paying basis, or dissolving the same."

E. C. Shelton, president of the board, presided at the meeting and Frank Baria, secretary, recorded the proceedings. Shelton stated the object of the meeting was a brief account of the financial condition of the association.

It appeared from figures presented that stockholders owe the association several hundred dollars in assessments, and that the organization also is in debt to the amount of several hundred dollars. The salary of the operator, Mrs. J. N. Weddle, has not been paid for several months, it was stated.

Many problems with which the association has been and is beset were recited by members conversant with conditions for several years, and proposals for reviving the organization were discussed from many angles.

Delinquent members whose lines had been disconnected, pursuant to orders from the directors, had reconnected and used the service, according to representations made at the meeting. These stockholders had failed to pay their assessments, it was stated.

The number of phones listed in the association was stated as from 184 to 288. Members who had had experience in other places stated that private telephone corporations collect \$2.50 to \$5 per month for telephone service. It was urged that cheaper rates and satisfactory service could be maintained by a mutual concern if proper cooperation were shown.

A motion prevailed authorizing and instructing the board of directors to place in the hands of an attorney the accounts due the association from delinquent members, taking court action if necessary. It was voted, however, to send out a collector before taking drastic action, in an effort to realize on the accounts.

## DAMAGE BY RIVER TOPIC OF HEARING

Albany—An amazing tale of damage from floods was unfolded yesterday at the hearing on flood control conducted by the Willamette Valley Flood Control association. That the Willamette and Santiam rivers are eating away thousands of dollars worth of rich bottom lands, removing the top soil from land remaining and actually threatening to destroy whole farms and communities was brought out by the more than two dozen witnesses that had taken the stand by early afternoon. The session, the results of which are to be compiled in statistical form, was conducted by County Judge D. O. Woodworth, president of the association. Sidney Klahn, Linn county engineer; Hedda Swart, Marion county engineer; and Tom Russell, regional PWA engineer, are in charge of the evidence.
