

TURNER CHURCH SESSION DRAWS BIG AUDIENCES

Turner—The 82nd annual state convention of Christian churches now in session at the tabernacle in Turner is drawing large crowds at the daily meetings. Friday's program opened at 8 o'clock in the morning with board meetings and conferences. At 10 o'clock in charge of Claude Neely, followed by the business meeting. A. C. Bates of Klamath Falls delivered the morning address at 10:45 o'clock on "Growing in the Stewardship of Money." Announcements preceded the second address, "Growing in the Stewardship of Life," by William R. Baird of Medford with the noon adjournment after.

The afternoon gathering is state mission day observance opening at 2 o'clock with song service. C. F. Swander, state secretary will give a report on the state board; O. W. Jones of Bend will talk at 2:30 o'clock on "Why I Believe in State Missions." At 3 o'clock there will be three 10-minute talks on project work in education by three prominent young people. The main address at 3:30 o'clock will be by T. T. Swearingen of St. Louis.

The evening program at 7:30 o'clock has special song service for half an hour with Claude Sablin of Forest Grove delivering the first sermon on "Growing in Appreciation of the Word of God." At 8:30 o'clock a special song number, followed by an interesting address by Dr. Stephen J. Corey of Indianapolis, guest speaker of the convention.

Saturday opens with the usual conferences and meetings with the 10:45 o'clock address by Rev. C. W. Reynolds of Portland on "Growing in Human Sympathy—Through Government Agency." Special announcements, address at 11:30, "Growing in Human Sympathy—Through Christian Brotherhood," by Guy L. Drill of Salem.

A benevolence program will be given at the afternoon session, convening at 2 o'clock conducted by Mrs. Clara Stivers Vernon of Eugene. At 3 o'clock the Ninety-Nine Men's Movement program will be conducted by J. M. Warner of McMinnville. Song service led by Claude Neely opens the 7:30 o'clock session with address followed by J. M. Warner on "Growing in Appreciation of Life's Needs." A special song will be given, then the second sermon by Dr. Stephen J. Corey.

Sunday, the last day of the state convention opens with Bible school classes at 9:45 o'clock with Ruth Winfield of Portland in charge of the assembly; morning worship at 11 o'clock, music directed by Claude Neely with Mrs. Helen Neely pianist; sermon, "Growing in Effectiveness in the Community," by E. F. Leake of Portland. At 3:30 o'clock a worship program will be given with the sermon by Willard A. Elkins of Monmouth at 3 o'clock on "Growing in Appreciation of the Lord's Table." At 3:30 o'clock the Lord's supper will be partaken of by the multitude of persons.
