WHEAT INSPECTION WORK CONTINUING

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BLAST DELAYS AUTO TRAFFIC

It was the result of a dynamite blast on the hill behind the Hammond Lumber company store, where the new county road is being constructed. Every car which had been parked in the street was soon half a mile away. However, when the dynamite did go off, very little rock flew, although there was lots of underground rock broken.
