

BANK RELEASE IS EFFECTIVE; OPENS MONDAY

Silverton—A. A. Schramm was in Silverton Thursday afternoon and completed the final arrangements whereby the Coolidge and McClaine bank of Silverton is released from restriction by the state banking board and will be opened under the new organization Monday morning.

The bank has been under restriction since March, 1933. A reorganization committee has spared no time or effort to accomplish what the final word of yesterday afternoon has signified to the business houses and all depositors of Silverton. The members of the committee have worked consistently for more than a year and know that a marked improvement in all business of the community will be in order.

A number of months was required to gain the signatures of the depositors to the necessary waivers, and after this was accomplished, many other phases of the state and federal requirements took time for readjustment.

Glenn Briedwell of McMinnville, was selected as president of the reorganized institution several weeks ago, and by Monday morning, July 9, all other alignments for the definite opening without restriction, will be finished.

The personnel of the committee includes George Hubbs, chairman, George Steelhammer, L. C. Eastman, Roy Morley and Norris Ames.

HAYWARD "JINXED" ACCIDENTS MANY

YOUNG PEOPLE HOLD SESSION
