

MOTOR OWNERS LEVIED FINES AT WOODBURN

Woodburn—E. C. Barnett appeared in Judge Overton's court Monday to answer to a charge of driving a motor vehicle without an operator's license. He entered a plea of guilty to the charge and was fined \$5 and costs. The judgment was suspended on condition that he obtain an operator's license, install a muffler on his car and pay the costs of the action.

NEW BRIDGE NEARING FINAL CONSTRUCTION

PRIEST CELEBRATES GOLDEN JUBILEE
