BLACK STARTS PRISON TERM

Dallas—Hugh G. Black, former county clerk of Polk county was dressed in at the Oregon state penitentiary Saturday afternoon following the pronouncement by Judge George Bagley that he be imprisoned for an indeterminate period of time not to exceed the maximum of one year. Judgment for the costs and disbursements of the trial were also awarded the plaintiff with interest at the rate of six per cent until paid.

Black, whose term as county clerk expired on December 31, 1932, was indicted and found guilty of the crime of larceny of public money, the trial taking place on May 22, 1933 and running until the 26th when a verdict of "guilty" was returned. Judge Bagley at that time set May 31 as the day for pronouncing sentence. A court order on the latter date postponed the sentencing of the defendant until December 2, 1933. On November 29 Judge Bagley again made another postponement, this time until July 1 at which time he imposed sentence.
