Woodburn—The Woodburn council meeting Tuesday night started off with a bang when Councilman Fred Miller brought up the subject of firecrackers, but the subject soon fizzled out when it was found that in spite of any ordinances that the city might pass the firecrackers would still be on sale just outside the city limits.

The majority of the councilmen seemed inclined to let the matter drop and not try to deprive the young people of their annual sport and it was intimated that Councilman Miller was getting older, which accounted for his annoyance at the noise made by firecrackers. The discussion was dropped from the last council meeting on the eve of July 4 when the patriotic noise all but prevented the transaction of business.

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LINN COUNTY'S FARMER UNION IN CONVENTION

Selo—"Change your legislature. You have one too many houses, and passing the buck is becoming too common."

Senator Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill county, independent candidate for governor of Oregon, addressed the Farmers' union county convention at Salt Lake school house east of Lebanon.

"Divide the state into 30 districts?" continued Zimmerman. "Yes, and decrease expenses. The farmers must be brought to the legislature. The wealth in the hands of a few people leaves the wealth untouchable. The farmer has to pay the taxes and interest. He has no money to spend. The factories are closed, no buying power. They can not buy the very thing they produce. * * * The producer must have his compensation. Therefore let us see to it that labor receives a compensation for its work. Let us see to it that no man's home can be sold for delinquent taxes."

Senator Zimmerman handled in some all the matter of power projects in Oregon. "The most outstanding is the Columbia river project," he said. "Now, what is going to happen when it is finished? It is no help to the general people. It seems to me that this is a design on the part of big business interests to gain more money. You will pay a lot to build these lines. Later on, these projects will soon become private property. To build these lines will end up, in my opinion, in nothing but private ownership using these plants to make large profits for their private owners. It will not bring payrolls to the treasury of Oregon."

State-owned banks should be established, Zimmerman said, and promised that if he becomes governor he will "fight for the bank bill to the end." The home and the farm are the two most valuable assets of the nation, Zimmerman concluded.

W. L. Teutsch, of the extension service and county agent division of Oregon State college, quoted a statement by W. E. Dodd, that "the farmer is a victim of circumstances." That "agriculture is doomed," as believed by many, Teutsch did agree, and he gave encouragement in the statement that "farm income in the United States has increased 46 per cent." That offers some opportunity for hope, he added. "Farm values have ceased to decrease. That is an indication that there is some improvement."

J. W. Motley of Knox Butte, president of the county convention, presided, and F. A. Galleghy of Selo officiated as secretary. The next quarterly convention is to be held at Riverview school house October 13. Farm union members are invited to attend. James Johnston will hold a picnic at his place near Thomas August 12. The convention voted to accept the invitation.
