CONTRACT AWARDED FOR HAULING BEANS

West Stayton—The West Stayton Co-op board of directors has hired A. C. Anderson of Salem to pick up and deliver to the Cleary & Hillman cannery of West Salem, the beans and tomatoes of the growers at the rate of \$1.50 per ton for beans and \$1.75 per ton for tomatoes.

Each grower is to have the beans and tomatoes piled at one place on the highway or other points accessible to a loaded truck. He assures that the produce will be handled with care and delivered in good condition.

Anderson will make two trips a day, more if necessary. The containers will be returned without additional charge. All details to be satisfactorily covered by a contract.
