Onions have been badly damaged by maggots this year, necessitating a second and in some cases a third planting. Among these were Louis Gaborino, James Yada and Tom Hoshing.

The Lahish celery growers have shipped several carloads of celery a month earlier than last year.

Tom VanCleave and son Alvin have commenced harvesting their crop of cultivated evergreen blackberries. Picky pickers are handling the crop which is ripening unusually fast and the season promises to be a short one.

Prunes are also promising to be an early and light crop in this district which boasts large orchards, none of which will have more than one-fourth of a normal crop.
