

MURDER THREAT LANDS MAN HERE FROM WOODBURN

Woodburn—W. H. McFarlan, 25, a painter by trade who resides on the road west of Duck Inn, appeared before Judge Hiram Overton Saturday for a preliminary hearing on a charge of threatening to commit murder. The complaint was filed by his father-in-law, Fred Sievers, and the hearing brought out the fact that while under the influence of liquor McFarlan had threatened the lives of both his father-in-law and his brother-in-law, with whom he and his wife make their home. Witnesses were Sadie Sievers, Myrtle McFarlan and Julia Parren. McFarlan was held to answer to the circuit court and his bail was fixed at \$250.

C. M. Gustaf of Salem, arrested for driving past a stop sign, entered a plea of guilty and paid a fine of \$5 and \$2 costs.

FIVE HALE PEACHES WEIGH POUND EACH

Hubbard—Five Hale peaches picked at the Eilers peach farm north of town weighed almost five pounds, one peach tipping the scale at one ounce less than a pound. According to Gerd Eilers, the rancher and fruit grower, this is an unusual year for peaches and especially for Hales. This is his outstanding crop for size and quality in 42 years of peach growing.

The Eilers peach orchard is a busy place as the farm is well known for its excellent fruit, peaches, plums, pears and apples, but especially for its peaches. The land lies on the Willamette river and the orchards are set out on the sanded river bottom. This accounts for the exotic taste of the fruit. Eilers bought this farm 42 years ago as he liked the small peach orchard on the place. From then on he began the study of peach culture and today has ten varieties of canning peaches.

This year the first peach was picked May 28, fully a month earlier than at any previous time. Eilers says it is the earliest picking since he began to grow peaches. From then on it has been a continuous run to the farm, one Sunday 250 cars calling for fruit. A small corps of men and women is kept busy picking, sorting and grading. It takes from 8 to 10 men and women to supply the demand for Eilers' peaches, some purchasers driving for 30 miles to reach the farm. It is expected that the peach season will last three more weeks.

Smith Keeps Job On Railroad Line

Solo—P. F. Smith, for many years in the employ of the Southern Pacific as operator in various sections of the Willamette valley, recently has had a position at Junction City where he may remain indefinitely. In Solo a few days ago Smith initiated photographs of himself, snapped during the "Oregon Trail" campaign, in which all men were requested to allow hirsute appendages for the big celebration in Eugene the latter part of July. At the close of the campaign Smith was pushing a formidable crop of whiskers.

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FOOT BRIDGE PLANS GIVEN NEW PROSPECT

Solo—Foot bridges on either side of the highway bridge spanning Thomas creek in Solo are to have attention in the near future, according to action taken at the August meeting of the town council. Whether the work shall be done by contract or by the day had not been decided at last report of the appropriate committee. The present structures are considered in need of repair to some extent, but economy suggests new bridges, it is believed. The work is to be completed this month, in order to escape the rainy season which may be due in September.

Irrigation out of designated hours in the city came in for another rap by the council. The subject has been discussed at previous meetings, and the ordinance still is violated. It was represented. Nozzles are removed from hose and water is allowed to run 24 hours at a time, it was stated.

Hazardous grass and weeds have been cut and removed in some sections of the city, it was reported, thus reducing fire menace to that extent. More of the work should be done, it was suggested.

Repairing of sidewalks came in for consideration, as per action taken at the July meeting of the council. Board walks still need attention, many of the non-resident as well as resident owners having failed to move in the direction ordered last month, according to representations made at the recent meeting.

Speed-limit signs, ordered at the July meeting, had not been erected. It was reported. Excessive driving through the streets of Solo had become more or less dangerous, it was reported at the July meeting and as a precaution it was decided to post speed-limit placards or board signs at four different entrances to the city.

Gravel for repairing certain streets that were torn up during the CWA campaign last winter, and at other times, will be available soon after the county crusher starts operation a short distance west of the city, it was reported. The crusher is expected to be in operation within a short time, according to a member of the committee considering the subject.

All members of the council were present and Mayor W. A. Ewing presided during the session. O. B. Cyrus recorded the proceedings.

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
