

DALLAS COUNCIL GIVEN REPORTS; PROSPECTS GOOD

Dallas—The city council met in regular session Monday night in the city hall with Mayor Left Fineth presiding. Quarterly reports from the city treasurer, the city auditor and the water commission were presented for the council's inspection. The period covered ended June 30.

The water commission reported receipts for the quarter as \$2,220.53 with disbursements \$2,066.82. The balance in hand is \$2,012.71. Included in the disbursements were two bonds for \$1,000 each. This makes the total amount paid off since the water works were purchased \$22,000, leaving a balance of \$99,000. The report shows that there was one new service, two renewals, six meters set and six removed.

The city fire marshal's report for the month of July showed six fires with a total loss of \$283. Only two residence fires were reported, the remaining ones being grass fires.

A petition bearing the names of a number of residents on the east end of Court street was presented to the council for their consideration. It referred to the burning of shavings and dust in that vicinity by the Dallas planing mill and the Buell core factory. The matter was turned over to the health and police committee for action.

C. B. Sundberg reported that the state highway commission had allotted \$5,000 for work on the north entrance to the city. This takes in Dimmick hill which is in poor shape at the present time. He also reported that a crew of six men were engaged under the SEPA in clearing away the brush on the two acres of ground recently acquired by the city as a dump ground. The work is being done to eliminate a bad fire hazard.

An interesting fact brought out at the meeting was that the city has no outstanding warrants at the present time.

REDUCTION SLATED FOR WATER USERS
